## Women Voters Join in Meeting Jan. 8

The annual all-day meeting of the Wilmette, Kenilworth, and Winnetka Leagues of Women Voters will open session at 10:30 o'clock on Monday morning, January 8. Mrs. George Gordon of Winnetka, Mrs. E. F. Snyder of Kenilworth, and Mrs. H. T. Reiling of Wilmette, respective program chairman for their leagues, have worked out a most comprehensive and meaty day's program through their departments of women in industry and legal status of women.

Mrs. Perry O. Crawford of Winnetka, Mrs. Dudley Taylor of Kenilworth and Mrs. Fred Rye of Wilmette, who head their departments of women in industry, are presenting Miss Annetta Dieckmann, industrial secretary of the Chicago Young Women's Christian Association, who will interpret the functions and activities of the N. R. A. and the C. W. A. James Mullenbach, special representative of the National Labor board, will supplement Miss Dieckmann's talk with discussion. Backed by his tremendous working knowledge of these two group organized influences, his time will be all too limited for an interested group of women.

Luncheon at 1 o'clock will be followed by an afternoon program under the legal status department, headed by Mrs. John F. Mannierre of Winnetka, Mrs. A. W. Ruf of Kenilworth, and Mrs. John P. Ballman of Wilmette. They will present Fred F. Schlodtfeldt, district director of immigration and naturalization under the U. S. Department of Labor. His subject will be "Our Foreign-Born Citizens."

Mrs. Phillip Ringer, chairman of the legal status department in the Cook County league, will follow with discussion. Miss Pearl Hart, an attorney whose experience as a public defender in the Women's court, makes her ably fitted, will place before the audience some of the difficulties met by unfortunate women, alone and defenseless, who are brought into this court.
