Critic Reluctant to Leave Concert by Duo-Pianists

By Joyce Whitman As delightful a recital as one could wish to hear was presented last Monday night at the New Trier auditorium by Ethel Bartlett and Rae Robertson, duo-piano artists. The concert, the third in the 1933-1934 series of recitals sponsored by The Winnetka Music club, followed the usual standard of excellence. The program was an example of outstanding balance of subject and mood. Each composition appeared and passed inevitably, in its right order, perfectly

The first group consisted of two Choral Preludes, by Bach, and the Sonata in B flat major, by Clementi. If one were familiar with two piano technique perhaps the unity of the two artists would not be so startling. But to me the orchestral effect of the two pianos was breath-taking. The artists played as one. Each showed complete mastery of his instrument; each had astounding technical facility; and each, simultaneously exhibited delicate phrasing and quality of tone. I can never forget the Bach "Jesu, My Heart's Joy" and, as evidence of its popularity with the audience, the artists repeated it as their last encore. The Clementi was charming, with perfect rhythm and sprightly melody.

The second group contained an "Andante and Variations", of Schumann and a fascinating "Rondo", by Chopin. This Rondo was particularly interesting to me as an example of youthful genius. Chopin wrote it at the age of 19, especially for two pianos. As an encore the ever delightful "Arensky Waltz" was received with much applause.

Of the last compositions, Lennox Berkeley's humorous Polka, Debussy's Fetes, arranged by Ravel, and the Rakoczy March were outstanding. After several encores the audience reluctantly left the hall, murmuring quite audibly of their pleasure and satisfaction.
