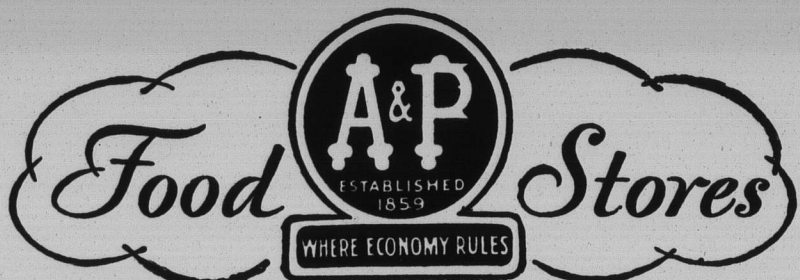

Mrs. Rose Seltenheim Dies Suddenly June 4

Mrs. Rose Seltenheim, 55 years of age, 2008 Central avenue, died suddenly of a heart attack in a parlor of the Wilmette Masonic temple, at 8:30 Monday evening, June 4.

Mrs. Seltenheim had dined with other members of the Eastern Star at the Shawnee Country club, and had gone with the party to the Masonic temple, where a meeting of the order was to be held. Just after entering the reception room she apparently became faint and brushed against another woman, immediately asking pardon for the act. In a moment she crumpled to the floor and was at once removed to an adjoining parlor. Dr. Floyd L. McGrath, who was in the building, responded to a call, but found the patient beyond help. She expired within seven minutes of the first evidence of the attack.

The remains were removed to Scott's Funeral home, 1118 Greenleaf avenue, where it was prepared for transference to Butler, N. J., where the funeral service is taking place today (Thursday), at the home of her son. Interment will be in Evergreen cemetery, Elizabeth, N. J. The remains were accompanied east by her daughter, Mrs. Allen D. MacKinnon, and Mr. MacKinnon.

Mrs. Seltenheim came to Wilmette from Butler, N. J., with the MacKinnons, about two years ago. A son by a former marriage, Fred Bernkopf, lives at Butler, and it was to his home the body was taken.

Mrs. Seltenheim was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and Daughters of Rebekah.
