No Concessions Allowed in Illinois Dunes Park

The newly opened Dunes Park of Illinois between Waukegan and the Wisconsin state line will be kept free from merry-go-rounds and other concessions, Arthur Fisher, of Hubbard Woods, president of the association that is leading the move-ment to convert the area into a state park, announced this week.

"Beach fires, hiking, horseback riding, swimming and picnics are the chief diversions at the park," said Mr. Fisher, "and we plan to keep the fifteen-hundred-acre tract in its present wild state as long as possible. It is now a refuge for scores of varieties of birds and many kinds of wild life. Even deer have been found there, and we believe ordinary amusement park devices would soon frighten them away."

Visitors are frobidden to bring firearms into the park but beyond that, and building fires in the woods, there are practically no restrictions. Beach fires are encouraged and are proving popular with picnickers who are seeking relief from the hot days by enjoying a cool swim and a supper on the three and one-half mile beach beside cheerful fires. 
