report, Mr. Davis explains what the Board of Recreation is. It is composed of members representing the Village board of trustees, the Board of Education, the Wilmette Park board, some woman's organization, and a member-at-large. The members are chosen by the organization which they represent and are confirmed by the Village president. Members for the past fiscal years were: Mrs. Herbert J. Leach, chairman, Henry Fowler, Robert M. Johnston, George E. Leal and Harry C. Kinne.

The staff which works under the supervision of Mr. Davis, who is in charge of community recreation and also public school physical education, consists of two men assistants, dividing their time between adult recreation and school physical training, and one woman assistant employed to do office work and direct women's activities. One of the men assistants is paid by the Board of Education.

Two women are also employed by the Board of Education to instruct in physical training in the schools and in the after-school intramural program for girls. Two recreation workers provided by the Federal Civil Works Education service assisted in conducting the program from January 1 to May 1 of this year. Extra help was added to the staff to assist in last summer's playground program.

### Staff Personnel

The staff personnel for last year included: Dudley C. Stone, Glen W.

Gathercoal and Miss Joe Skidmore. Physical training instructors were Mrs. Olga S. Ball at Stolp school and Mrs. Gertrude Fanckboner at Howard school. Miss Dee Riggle and William T. Mackie, Jr., were CWES helpers assisting in the conduct of the program.

Acknowledgement and appreciation has been expressed to the official group of the Village for its support to the recreation program during the past year. In this acknowledgement Mr. Davis names especially the Village president, C. P. Dubbs, the Village board, the Board of Education, and the Park board. He also expresses appreciation of the services rendered by WILMETTE LIFE in giving publicity to the board activities during the year.
