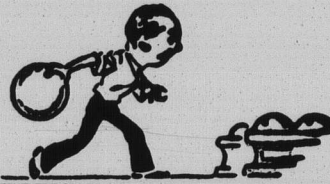

## With the BOWLERS

## Museum Publishes Catalogue of Birds

Field Museum of Natural History announces publication of Part VII of a huge reference work of vast scientific importance, the Catalogue of the Birds of the Americas. The new section of this monumental research accomplishment, which has just come from Field Museum Press contains 531 pages, and brings the total number of pages for all parts completed to date up to nearly 3,000 pages. With descriptive listings of all species and sub-species of birds occurring in North, Central and South America and the adjacent islands, four more large publications will be required to complete this great compendium of information on the thousands of kinds of winged life in this hemisphere. The work was initiated by the late Dr. Charles B. Cory, who prepared the several first volumes, and it has been carried on since his death by Dr. Charles E. Hellmayr, associate curator of birds, who is responsible for the latest additions to the series of books. The publications are of vital importance to ornithologists.

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
