

Collector Hale Again Leads in Tax Collections

Sanborn Hale, tax collector of New Trier township maintains his million dollar collection record and in the collection of the 1933 taxes again leads all town collectors in Cook county in the matter of total taxes collected.

This fact is revealed in a report which Collector Hale has just received from the county treasurer showing a total collection in New Trier township of \$1,011,069.41, from November 28 to December 26, when he received notice to return the books to the office of the county treasurer for the regular audit.

Collector Hale announced this week that within a week or ten days all taxing bodies will receive checks to complete the payment of moneys collected and due the various taxing bodies.

It is also announced that beginning January 16 the penalty of one per cent a month on unpaid real estate and personal property tax will be applied and that the second one per cent will be applied February 1, and then one per cent per month thereafter.

Of the total of \$1,011,069.41 of 1933 taxes just collected by Collector Hale, \$833,405.86 was for real estate and \$177,663.55 for personal property.

The 1933 total tax bills of the township amounted to \$2,981,278.75, of which \$2,486,915.74 was real estate and \$494,363.01 personal.

The total amounts collected in each of the several villages of the township were approximately as follows:

That part of Evanston and Glenview within New Trier township, \$36,464.51.
Glencoe, \$211,396.29, of which \$177,567.55 was for real estate and \$33,828.74 personal.

Winnetka, \$392,612.83, of which \$314,871.08 was for real estate and \$77,741.75 for personal.

Kenilworth and that part of Northfield in New Trier, \$102,779.74, of which \$88,779.74 was real estate and \$14,000.00 personal.

Wilmette, \$267, 816.04, of which \$215,722.98 was for real estate and \$52,093.06 personal.

Legion Auxiliary

A discussion of Fidac and Americanism will feature the monthly sewing meeting the American Legion Auxiliary will hold Thursday night, January 17, at the home of Mrs. G. A. Stone, 1609 Tenth street. All members are urged to be present.

The American Legion Auxiliary held its regular meeting at the Masonic temple Monday evening, January 14. A large crowd enjoyed the fine reports given by the chairmen of the various committees, particularly the Christmas activities.

In keeping with the nation-wide recognition of January as legislative month in the American Legion auxiliary, Edward W. Parlee, past commander of the Rogers Park post, has outlined the Legion program for the year, with special reference to the legislation the Legion will ask from the present Congress.

It is commonly known that the Legion will ask for the immediate payment of the adjusted service certificates—commonly and erroneously called the bonus. This demand will be made as a sound recovery measure, in line with the governmental policy, and as a method of removing many veterans from the relief rolls.

The other legislation anticipated includes: a demand for the universal draft law, long a part of the Legion policy; strengthening the national defense; and federal protection for widows and orphans of deceased World war veterans.

Mr. Parlee stated the Americanism program will be made a primary activity of the Legion in 1935. Parts of this program that may reach the legislature for action are: the desire to make Armistice day a national holiday; to transfer investigation of aliens from the Department of Labor to the Department of Justice; that ability to read English be made a prerequisite for naturalization; that American home owners receive preference over aliens in home and farm loans; that teachers be required to take an oath to uphold the Constitution of the United States; that aliens be obliged to bear arms in defense of the flag, and that the recognition of Soviet Russia be rescinded.

The Legion has regularly supported child welfare legislation, and as an organization has been interested in promoting youth activities as support to a strong Americanism program.

Mr. Parlee concluded his address by covering the legislative program adopted by the department of Illinois for presentation to the state legislature. In this program are child welfare and emergency relief items and requests covering some of the state institutions where veterans are housed.
