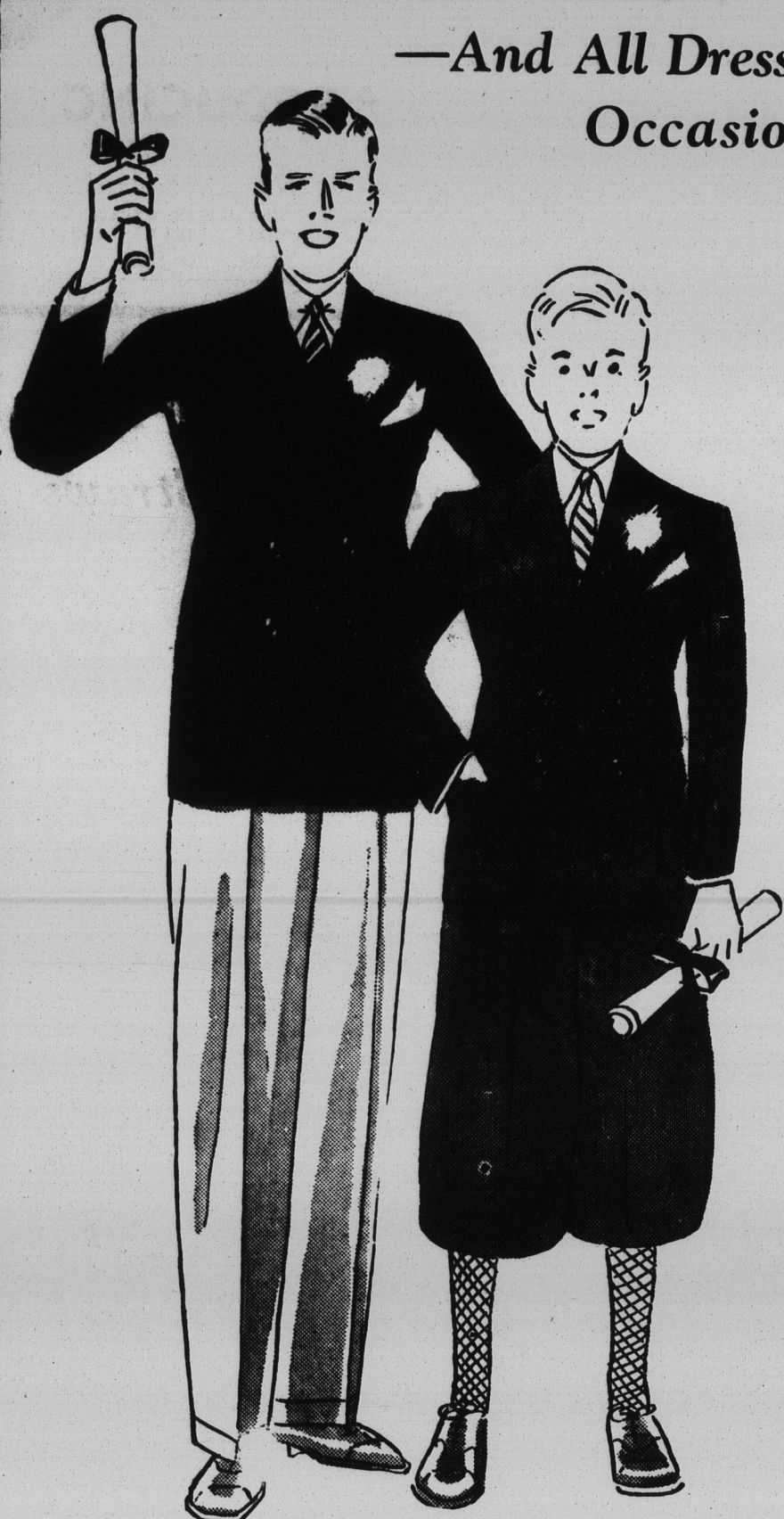

HEALTH CENTER NEWS

The Chicago Tuberculosis institute, with which Wilmette Health Center is affiliated, will hold the annual health exhibit of its community health centers on May 25, at 1:30 p. m., at 360 N. Michigan avenue, Chicago. The program subject will be, "1935 Early Diagnoses Campaign." Refreshments will be served, and the public is invited to attend.

One of the most comprehensive health exhibits ever to be displayed by the Chicago Tuberculosis institute opened Monday, May 20, in the Woman's club department (ninth floor) of Mandel Brothers, State street store and continue through Saturday, May 25. This exhibit contains charts, graphs, posters and others illustrative material depicting the accomplishments and features of the many health programs of the Chicago Tuberculosis institute.

The next Infant Welfare clinic will be held Wednesday, June 12, from 2 to 4 p. m., at Wilmette Health Center.

The next chest clinic will be on Monday, June 17, from 1 to 3 p. m. Dr. J. Novak, medical director of Chicago Tuberculosis institute, will be in charge.

The New Trier High school dental clinic is held Wednesdays from 9 to 12.

Children who have had one dose of toxide will return to Health Center Tuesday, June 4, at 1 p. m., for the second treatment Dr. Martin Seifert, Health commissioner of Wilmette, has charge of this clinic.

Dedicate Chancel Window Sunday to Memory of Pastor

A beautiful stained glass window, installed in the chancel of St. John's Lutheran church Wilmette and Park avenues, this week, will be dedicated Sunday morning May 26, to the memory of the former pastor of St. John's, the late Rev. Herman W. Meyer. The service will begin at 11 o'clock.

The window is of the English type, and its three panels contain nine medallia. The medallia of the left panel illustrate three Old Testament events: God appearing to Moses in the burning bush Exodus 3:1-10; God giving the tables of the law to Moses. Exodus 20:1-17; the brazen serpent, a type of the crucified Christ, Numbers 21:5-9 and John 3:14-15.

The right panel presents three scenes from the life of the apostle after whom the church is named—St. John. One medallion shows John and Mary beneath the cross, John 19:25-27; another, John and Peter healing the lame man, Acts 3:1-10; the third, the vision of John on the isle of Patmos, Revelation 1:1-9.

The middle and largest panel has three medallia from the life of Christ: The baptism of Christ, Matthew 3:13-17; the crucifixion of Christ, Luke 23:33-46; the risen Lord and Peter, John 21:15-17.

This window had been planned and its subjects chosen by the Rev. Mr. Meyer several years before his death in November, 1933. During his twenty-year pastorate the congregation grew from 105 to 365 communicant members. Under his leadership the new church at Wilmette and Park avenues was built in 1923. He was succeeded by the Rev. J. H. Gockel of Chicago, the present pastor, who had also assisted him for a year and a half previous to his passing.
