**Prepare to Compile  
"Inklings" Contribs**

A campaign will be started shortly for contributions to "Inklings," New Trier's literary magazine, the second edition of which will be published about the middle of December. The deadline for all material for the publication is November 1, it was announced this week.

The first issue of "Inklings," off the press last May, was the English department's contribution to the celebration of the three-hundredth anniversary of secondary education in the United States. The cover design, with an inset showing the artist's conception of the Boston Latin school, first secondary school in this country, was commemorative of that anniversary.

R. S. Peterson, who was chairman of the committee of faculty sponsors for the first issue, also will guide the student editors in the preparation of materials for the second issue.

**Set Days for Girls

**Suburban League  
Board of Control  
to Elect Officers**

Election of officers for 1935-1936 was scheduled to take place at the Suburban league board of control's first meeting of the new term Thursday of this week at the University club in Chicago. Frederick A. Kahler, New Trier's dean of boys, has been chairman of the board ever since the league was organized.

Membership of the entire board has remained practically intact since the league's inception. Only the representatives from Morton and Evanston high schools have been changed. The other schools in the league are Proviso of Maywood, Deerfield-Shields, Oak Park and Waukegan. Waukegan was admitted to membership last year, and Morton was re-instated after being dropped for a time.

The member schools have voted 6 to 1 to use the freshman-sophomore teams for preliminary games during the basketball season. Heretofore the lightweight teams have engaged in the preliminary scraps. The varsity teams have been called heavyweights, as distinguished from the lightweights. Under the new arrangement the varsity fives will be referred to as "the varsity," and emphasis will be removed from the lightweight teams. Schools wishing to schedule lightweight games will do so at their own discretion.

Next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock has been set as the deadline for tryouts for the Scribblers club of New Trier. Contributions will be accepted in the fields of poetry, short story, essay and drama, it is announced, and students have been advised to turn their material in to H. C. Pifer or to Miss Louise Hamilton, the club sponsors. The quota of membership is 24, one for each 100 students in school. Only five of last year's members—Mary Jane Farley, Craig Hazelwood, Mary Neeves, Richard Appleyard and Catherine Stevenson—are still in school, so there is plenty of room for other students desiring to become members. The next meeting of the club will be on October 8. Programs for the year will include addresses by a number of authors and poets.
