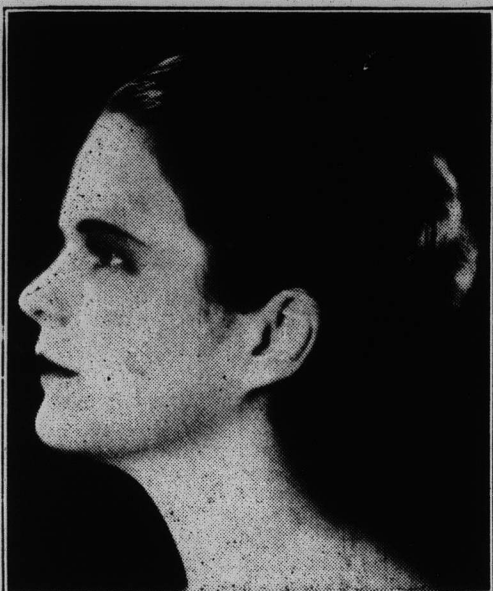
Tea will be served after the fashion show, under the direction of Mrs. Robert Butz and her committee.
