

New Trier Wins Suburban Title; Clashes With Evanston on Saturday

Defeat of Waukegan Puts Local Boys on Top

New Trier High school's undefeated football team, champion of the Suburban league, rolled along to another victory, its eighth of the season, last Saturday. Dundee was the victim, and the score was 27 to 0. The game was played at Dundee.

Already New Trier partisans are talking about a state championship, and their team, provided it wins the three games remaining on its schedule, might lay claim to such honors. Two of the remaining games are with strong down-state elevens, Moline at Moline Saturday of next week and Champaign at New Trier on Thanksgiving day (November 28).

Meet Evanston Next

But before taking on Moline and Champaign the New Trier boys have other business of equal importance. The annual scrap with Evanston, long a bitter but friendly rival of New Trier, is scheduled for this Saturday afternoon at Evanston. It will be the final Suburban league game of the season for New Trier. Evanston, last year's league champion and generally regarded as New Trier's jinx, has had a poor season and will go into the game with nothing to lose. A victory over New Trier would do much to help the Evanstonians forget the 35 to 0 whipping that Oak Park handed them a couple of weeks ago.

Seek Clear Record

New Trier, on the other hand, cannot afford to lose to Evanston this time. Every other Suburban league school has been whipped by New Trier, and defeat by Evanston would be nothing short of disastrous, even though New Trier does have the league championship in the bag.

On paper there should be no question about the outcome. New Trier's record, of course, is impressive, while Evanston's, for the most part, is not. There is one bright spot in Evanston's league record for the season, a 54 to 0 victory over Morton, but Morton is the weakest team in the league. Evanston also trounced Lake View of Chicago, 76 to 0, so the New Trier boys are on the lookout for potential Evanston power.

Evanston Trims Deerfield

While New Trier was playing a non-conference game last Saturday the Evanston team was improving its league record by beating Deerfield-Shields of Highland Park, 12 to 6. Deerfield lost to New Trier a week earlier, 20 to 0.

Last Saturday also saw the elimination of Waukegan as a contender for league honors. Oak Park turned the trick, 20 to 6. Waukegan now has lost two games, and Oak Park, although defeated only once (by New Trier), was held to a scoreless tie by Morton and would not be entitled to a tie for the championship even though Evanston should score an upset victory over New Trier Saturday.

Reserves Get Chance

Against Dundee Coach W. J. Aschenbach of New Trier started his second team. After the game was six minutes old Aschenbach sent in his first team, and on the first play, an off tackle smash, George Laing, New Trier's brilliant left halfback, aided by perfect interference broke loose on a 50-yard run for a touchdown.

New Trier was leading 7 to 0 at the half. The ball was on the Dundee five-yard line as the half ended. Deprived of a second touchdown at this stage of the game, the New Trier boys

got busy in the third quarter. They scored again, Bill Rothermel, halfback, carrying the ball over.

In the final quarter New Trier counted twice, the first time on a pass from Laing to Tom Gallagher, right halfback, and the second time on a 40-yard run by the fleet-footed Laing.
