Kenilworth Enjoys Banner Permit Month; Four Residence Total \$54,250 Cost

Six building permits for improvements totalling \$63,245 were issued in Kenilworth during the month of October. Four of the permits were for new residences costing \$54,250; one was for a commercial building, valued at \$7,000 and the other was for an alteration and addition job costing \$1,995. In volume of business October was one of the best month for building activities in Kenilworth in the past few years.

The new residences range in price from \$10,500 to \$18,000, and with one exception the plans for each call for a two-car attached garage. The other building will have an attached onecar garage.

Eugene C. Bauer is building a twostory solid brick residence and attached two-car mrage at 515 Kenilworth avenue, costing \$18,000.

A permit was issued to Henry Herbel for a two-story brick veneer residence and attached two-car garage at 387 Sterling road, costing \$15,050.

David B. Sterrett is building a two-story frame and brick residence with attached one-car garage, at 726 Roger avenue, costing \$10,500.

A permit was issued to Eugene E. Murphy for a one and one-half story brick veneer residence, with attached two-car garage, at 737 Maclean avenue, costing \$10,500.

The commercial building for which a permit was issued to Fred Breitling, is being erected at 410 Green Bay road. It is to be one story in height and of brick construction, and will be occupied by the The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea company, as a grocery and market. The cost of the building is \$7,000.

The permit for a remodeling job was issued to A. W. Scarratt, who is building a brick veneer and stucco addition to his residence at 521 Kenilworth avenue, costing \$1,995.

Chrysanthemum Shows Open in Chicago Parks

The annual Chrysanthemum displays in the three Chicago Park District Conservatories opened Thursday, November 7 and will continue through December 1, according to August Koch, chief horticulturist. 15,000 plants—half a million chrysanthemum blooms-will be on view at Garfield, Lincoln and Washington Park conservatories. Admission is free. Garfield and Lincoln conservatories will be open daily, including Sundays, from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. while Washington Park conservatory will be open daily from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

The Chrysanthemum show is the premier exhibition of the year, for the gorgeous flowers, their great range of color, and the various methods of culture make them the most popular of all greenhouse flowers. Over 700 varieties will be included in the display this year, and range all the way from the original species grown in China as long ago as 2.000 B.C. to superb modern varieties with 21-inch blooms. New and spectacular hybrids will be shown for the first time.

Among the featured attractions are great hanging baskets each with a thousand blooms of yellow, pink, and white flowers; grafted plants with as many as 75 kinds growing as part of a single specimen; cascades of drooping flowers that completely cover the sides of huge window boxes; and bush plants with numerous blooms of the single, pompon, Japanese, and other types.

The many novel arrangements and combinations include every color and hue, except blue which has never been produced in a chrysanthemum. Changes in the displays are made from time to time during the show period.

The display at Garfield Park this year will be a replica of a formal French garden and will be staged in Horticultural Hall, with the adjoining Show House also filled with masses of bloom.
