receiving the name of the Lorraine Cross, saw the double barred cross. He liked it and adopted it as his emblem. The shape was changed a little, the lower bar being slipped down, and in this form it was adopted by the descendants of Godfrey as the standard of the house of Lorraine. "During the World war one of the divisions of the American army which was quartered in that part of France, took the Lorraine cross as its insignia. "In 1906 the National Tuberculosis association adopted the double barred cross as the symbol of the campaign against tuberculosis.

"In 1913, finding that some people drew the cross one way and some another, the National association set up certain rules so that all tuberculosis crosses would be exactly alike. Accordingly the standard proportions for making the cross now are: The upright bar and the two horizontal bars are the same width. This width is called a unit. The arms extend 3 units from the vertical standard; the upright below the lower arm is 7 units.

"In 1920, in order to prevent anyone not connected with a tuberculosis association from using this emblem, the National association registered it at Washington as a trade mark."

"Seal" Your Parcels

The Christmas Seal campaign will continue from Thanksgiving until Christmas. During that period it is urged that no villager send letters or packages by mail or otherwise, without affixing one of the attractive aids to tuberculosis sufferers, both adults and children.

to the popular idea that Wilmette has little or no destitution, he reminds them that there are now 147 cases on relief, and that this number is likely to be considerably increased as the severity of winter grows. Wilmette does have its own problem of unemployment and distress, which will be met only by the benevolence of its own citizens. For this reason, Mr. Fowler and Mr. Kinne are urging most earnestly that every person who can do so, not only make a subscription, but, if possible, increase his subscription to the Chest.

Face Unfortunate Alternative

Last year no agency receiving support from the Chest was paid more than one-half of the amount it was promised, and there are indications that the Chest must either raise its full amount, or these member agencies will, in some cases at least, be forced to withdraw and put on their own campaigns. Such withdrawals would probably mean the breaking up of the Chest and would bring about not only nine separate campaigns but probably a number of others that are now being kept out because of the restraining influence of the Chest, for the Chest not only raises money for the approved agencies, but it also acts as an investigating body to determine the merits of any appeal that might be proposed. The Chest plan saves the community in time, effort and money. Gifts made to the Chest may, if the donor desires, be given to any selected charity.

The Chest board wishes to complete this canvass just as quickly as possible, but insists that it must continue until the full \$25,000 is raised, and urges every citizen to make his or her subscription at 1148 Central avenue, if he has not been called on up to this time.
