Fire Insurance Rates Reduced on Frame Homes

Good news is in store for owners and occupants of frame residences in the Cook county area, according to H. D. Hill of Hill & Stone, Winnetka insurance and real estate experts. Official notice has just been received from the Chicago Board of Underwriters that, effective as of November 1, 1935, rates on frame dwellings and their contents have been reduced from about 7 per cent up to about 25 per cent, according to the exposures of each individual risk.

Here are several examples of the savings cited by Mr. Hill:

A residence with a wood shingle roof detached from other frame dwellings, distances between 10 and 25 feet, formerly cost \$4 for \$1,000 of fire insurance. Under the new rul-ing this same home will be insured for \$1,000 at the annual premium of \$3. The homes which are detached 25 feet or more from other frame dwellings do not fare so well in the new reductions, however, \$1,000 of insurance for one-year term will now cost \$3 as against \$3.20 under the old order. It will be readily seen that the board has favored the home owner whose property is more crowded in than others.

On the other hand, the owners or occupants of brick or stone-veneered residences, will have cause for groaning from the fact that their properties have now been classed strictly as frame structures and their rates have gone up, instead of down. The proportion of veneered homes on the north shore is very large. The increase, however, is not great, it now costing \$3 per \$1,000 per year as against \$2.80 before.

Existing policies may be cancelled and rewritten for the same amount and term as originally written, to take advantage of any saving, and Mr. Hill has requested his clients to the Oxfords, relegating the Sterlings take advantage of his service in this matter.
