Actor Makes Real Quaint Characters in "Pickwick Papers"

Mr. Pickwick, his friends of the Pickwick club, Sam Weller, Mr. Wel-ler senior, Mrs. Bardell, her women friends, her son, her lawyer of the trial scene, and the judge-one by one stepped out upon the stage of the Woman's Club of Wilmette at the afternoon meeting of the club December 4. Frank Speaight, celebrated English actor, like a sleight of hand performer, produced the whimsical characters from "Pickwick Papers" out of the air and made them live and act and talk.

Very simply Mr. Speaight began the century old narrative, acting the role of each character as he or she came into the story. He was roundfaced, corpulent, naive and middle aged; he was sharp-faced, thin and shrewd; he was the soft and rounded Mrs. Bardell reposing in the unwilling arms of Mr. Pickwick. Lowering his glasses on his nose, now letting his shoulders droop, now pushing out his chest, now opening his mouth in blank amazement, now snapping his fingers, now pacing back and forth. flapping his coat tail at every turn. Mr. Speaight skillfully impersonated the different kinds of men and women who make "Pickwick Papers" so amusing. He was the judge in robe and wig, he was Mr. Pickwick in the barrow, he was Sam pushing the barrow.

He told the story in all seriousness, beginning with the scene where Mr. Pickwick's landlady mistakes his meaning and thinks she is receiving a proposal of marriage and continuing with the scene where the breach of promise notice is served on the innocent Mr. Pickwick. The hunting episode follows, where Mr. Winkle's ignorance of firearms alarms Mr. Pickwick; then the part where Sam tells about the cats and "weal pie flavor"; the scene where Sam and Mr. Pickwick are at the barrister's; the scene in Mr. Pickwick's chambers; Sam at Mrs. Bardell's listening, waiting to find out how Mrs. Bardell is disposed towards his employer-for "he well knew that he had only to remain quiet and the women were sure to talk"; Sam hurrying to and fro between the lawyer's and his employer's, always with the same reply from the lawyer, "as well as possible," to Mr. Pickwick's question, "Is all going on well?"; the scene between Sam and Mr. Weller, senior, where the latter suggests that Mr. Pickwick needs an "halibi," and the trail scene where Dodson and Fogg win out and Mr. Pickwick chooses jail to paying them -F. B. M.
