## RETROSPECT . . . .

As this year passes from the stage of time, Wilmette Sea Scouts can look back upon it with a full measure of satisfaction. A year ago the boys had but two small sail boats. Last summer five Wilmette Sea Scout sail boats competed in the Commodore's race. The race was patrolled by Skipper Will C. Huggins in the "Ouilmotte," a 40-foot yacht he obtained during the year. The latter vessel is a fine, powerful, seaworthy craft with sleeping accommodations for six. Its size has made it possible to give the boys much training they otherwise would not have had.

Not only in equipment has the status of the boys been advanced. They are richer by far in the pleasant and exhilarating experiences afforded by Sea Scouting: ghosting along the untroubled surface of the lake under a warm sun; dropping anchor and swimming about their small boats like south sea natives diving for pearls; tan, healthy bodies glistening in the spray as eager hulls are driven into a short southwest shop; handling a large power vessel; the adventure of overnight cruises up the shore.

Cooperation has brought to the Sea Scouts a first prize in a hobby show and a two-star award in a merit badge show. Study and application has resulted in tests being passed.

## N. S. Scout Units to Renew Charters

With few exceptions all of the troops, packs and ships of the North Shore Area council are due to register and make application for the renewal of their charter for the year 1936.
