North Western Announces Free Pick-up of Freight

Free pick up and delivery of less than carload freight at every agency station on the Chicago and North Western railway, one of the most wide reaching and important freight service developments of this century, will go into effect at almost 1,000 points on January 20, 1936, H. W. Beyers, vice-president, Traffic of the North Western, Chicago, announces.

This free service means that anyone shipping or receiving merchandise within the Western Trunk line and Illinois Freight territory can turn the whole job over to the railway—store door to store door—and receive the complete pick up and delivery service for the cost of what has up to now been railroad station to railroad station service.

The states served by the North Western, namely, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Upper Michigan, Illinois, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Wyoming and Iowa as well as Colorado, Utah, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Missouri and Montana will have this service. All North Western agency stations will have this new feature with no exceptions—in some of the other states certain exceptions will be made.

Local trucking and transfer concerns will handle the work for the Chicago and North Western railway under a contract agreement with the road. It is felt by officials of the road that local business men will be aided by the expected pick up in this type of business under such an arrangement. In case the shipper or receiver elects to perform his own delivery or pick up he will be allowed 5c per hundred pounds by the railway.

"The shipment of merchandise freight on American railroads has been shrinking constantly during the last fifteen years," Mr. Beyers stated in commenting on the change. "Much of this has been due to the fact that railroads have not been able to offer 'complete' service. We on North Western are confident that this new free pick up and delivery service, although installed at a considerable expense, eventually will not only halt the flow of merchandise traffic from the rails but also will result in a steady increase in this type of business."
