## Foreign Affairs School to Open Sunday Afternoon

A discussion of "The London Naval Conference and the Far Eastern Problem" will open the eleventh School of Foreign Affairs, on January 5, in the great hall of the First Methodist Episcopal church, Evanston. Dr. Kenneth W. Colegrove of the department of political science of Northwestern university, will present the current picture of the situation, and answer some vital questions concerning the significance of facts underlying the conference.

Dr. Colegrove received his Ph. D. from Harvard, and since 1919 has been a member of the political science department of Northwestern university, first as associate professor, and in 1926 becoming a professor of political science.

In 1929 he spent a year abroad, during which he was an editor of the European Economic and Political Survey.

He was appointed a member of the board of personnel examiners of the United States Department of Labor in 1933.

Dr. Colegrove is the author of "American Citizens and Their Government" and "International Control of Aviation," as well as several articles in professional journals.

He is a member of the American Society of International Law, and the Americas Political Science association.

The Far Eastern situation touches the United States more closely than perhaps the European one, owing to our relation with the Philippines. Dr. Colegrove feels that attention being given the Ethiopian war, may well have overshadowed the importance of events in Asia.

The meetings of the School of Foreign Affairs are being held Sunday afternoons at 4 o'clock during January. They are open to the public, without charge.

Each address will be followed by a buffet supper, at which the speaker of the day will be present to assist in the informal discussion.
