Besides rendering financial aid, the North Shore auxiliary has contributed between 1,500 and 2,000 infant garments to the center during the past year. Members of the auxiliary also aid the center by volunteering their services to furnish transportation for the doctors and internes, and to assist with the clerical work at the station. An average of fifty women is reporting for duty every month spending many hours each in chauffeuring or doing clerical duty.
