

Margaret Anglin Heads Cast of 'Great Catherine' at N. U. Theater

Shaw's Play Is Presented in Evanston for Four-Day Run

Margaret Anglin, one of the foremost actresses of the American stage, is heading the cast of the University theater at Northwestern, appearing as guest artist this week in a production of Shaw's "The Great Catherine." The play opened Tuesday for a four-day run under direction of John Baird.

Miss Anglin, who was recently seen on Broadway in "Fresh Fields," arrived in Evanston Tuesday to join the student cast which has been in rehearsal for the last two weeks. From here she will leave again for the east to appear at several of the summer theaters along the eastern coast.

Honored by Notre Dame

Her work in the theater has been recognized by the University of Notre Dame, which presented her with the Laetare medal, an award made each year to an outstanding Catholic layman. Among other holders of this medal are Augustin Daly, Agnes Repplier, Chief Justice E. D. White, Alfred E. Smith and John MacCormack.

Miss Anglin has appeared almost continuously for the last two decades in plays throughout the country. Her Shakespearean roles and her parts in Greek tragedy have been hailed as outstanding by the critics, although many writers on the theater con-

sider her at her best in high comedy.

It is this type of roles she will portray in "The Great Catherine."

In the supporting cast are some of the leading campus players, including Earl Wynn, William McCreary, Marian Barber, Philip Slep and Eleanor Higgins.

the House of David this Saturday. The tourists will leave the Davis street "L" station at 7:30 a.m.

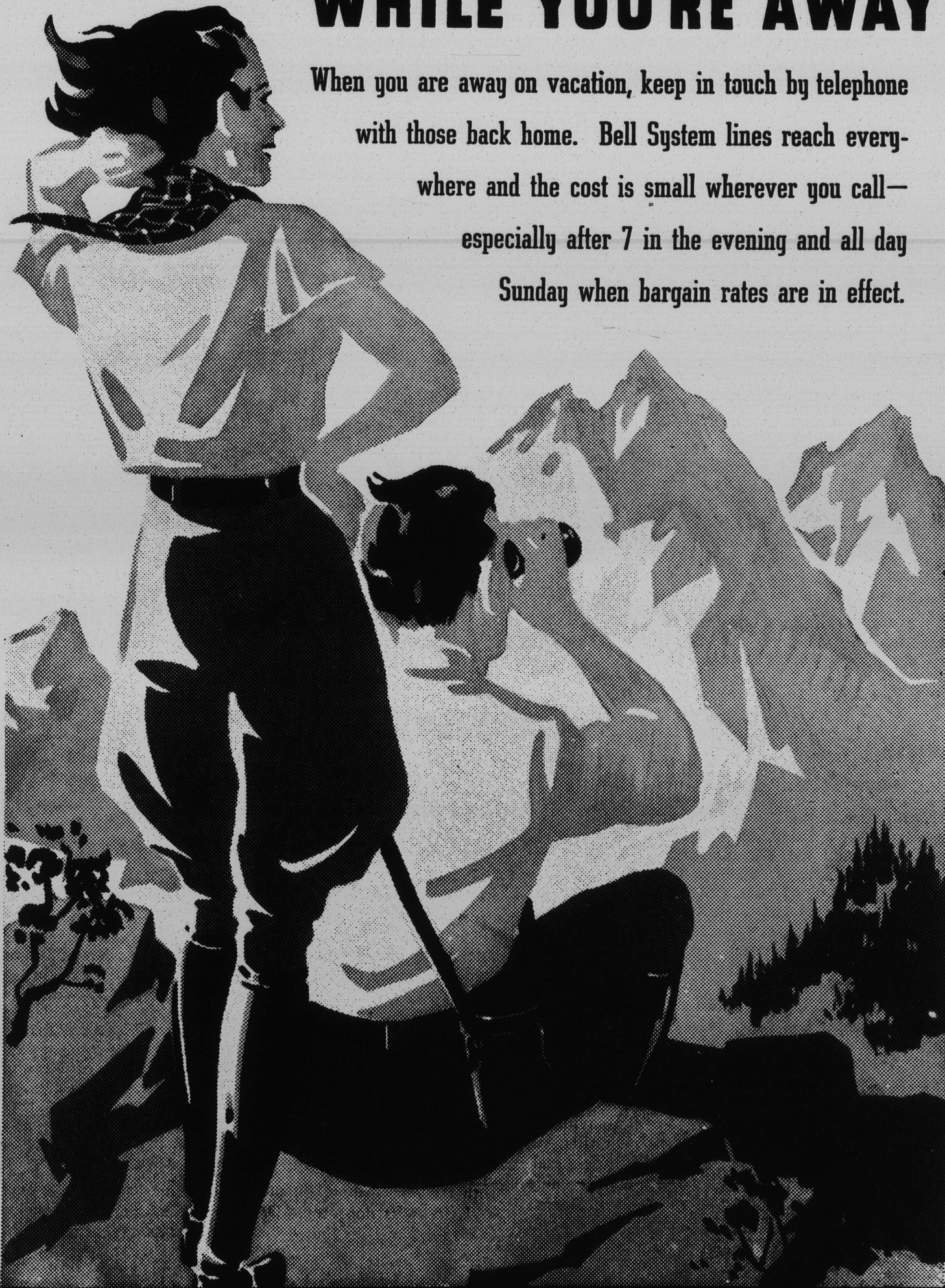
ON WESTERN TOUR

Institute Hopes to Improve Church Music

Methods of elevating the standards of church music and encouraging congregational singing are being studied at Northwestern university this week, as more than a hundred and twenty-five musical directors and organists from churches in thirty states are gathered for the fourth annual Church and Choral Music Institute. The conference, sponsored by Northwestern's School of Music, continues from Monday through Friday.

In addition to group singing the delegates were to discuss means of maintaining interest and devising repertoires for volunteer church choirs and organizing programs for special services. A series of conferences on organ playing was also arranged.

Members of the faculty include H. Augustine Smith, director of Fine Arts in Religion at Boston university; Edgar Nelson, president of the Chicago Conservatory of Music; Wilhelm Middelschulte, former organist for the Chicago Symphony orchestra; Palmer Christian, organist for the University of Michigan; Horace Whitehouse, associate professor of organ and church music at Northwestern; Walter Allen Stults, concert singer, and Oliver Seth Beltz, associate professor of the Theory and History of Music at Northwestern.

COMMEMORATE MARTYRDOM
