Troop Ships With Naval Convoy Will Play Lake Waters

Troop ships with navy convoys will ply the waters of Lake Michigan early in August when National Guard units from Illinois and Wisconsin join the Blue Army for the largest and most modern training exercise to be held in the Middle West since the World war.

From an area of more than 300,000 square miles, the National Guard and Regular Army troops of seven states will assemble for the Second Army maneuvers. Field Orders issued by Major General Charles E. Kilbourne, commanding the Second Army, direct that this concentration embody all of

Begin on East Shore

The VI Corps of the Second Army which includes the 33rd Division, Illinois National Guard, and the 32nd Division, National Guard, from Wisconsin and Michigan, will commence active operations from bivouacs not far inland from the east shore of Lake Michigan, near Allegan, East Saugatuck and Fennville. Water transport across the lake affords a direct route to these bases and in addition provides the training incident to embarkation, debarkation and water travel under army transport regulations.

Approximately 3,500 officers and men of the 33rd Division including Division headquarters, 66th Brigade headquarters, five regiments and spe-

cial troops will leave Chicago on the S.S. Roosevelt on August 8 for South Haven, Mich. The first transport movement starts at 12:30 A.M. and the second at 10:15 A.M.

Use Converted Car Ferries

Converted car ferries of the Grand Trunk Steamship company and the Pere Marquette Steamship company will transport approximately 2,700 troops, in four trips from Milwaukee to Grand Haven, Mich., under naval escort furnished by the U. S. Coast Guard. Scheduled sailing times are 6 A.M., 8 A.M., 10:30 A.M., 9 P.M., all on August 8.

Convoys from the VI Corps Motor Pool at Fennville, Mich. will transport troops from points of debarkation to their respective unit bivouac areas. Troops returning to Chicago via water transport will arrive from St. Joseph, Mich., on August 22.

Accomplished In 48 Hours

"In keeping with the necessity for increasing the mobility of our military forces, this concentration of the Second Army will be accomplished in a comparatively short time, the equivalent of approximately 48 hours," Major General Kilbourne stated in outlining the operation.

"However, the actual time involved in movements could have been further reduced, if it were not essential to take account of public convenience, costs and the requirements of a coordinated plan of training.

"While the water transport of troops is a valuable training feature, the bulk of the movement will be by rail and motor. The V Corps of the Second Army will concentrate in the vicinity of Fort Knox, Ky., on August 1 and 2."

Use 30 Troop Trains

Thirty troop trains and 50 motor convoys will be required to carry the men, equipment and supplies of the VI Corps. Troop train movements have been carefully interlocked with existing passenger schedules to avoid interference with normal railway operations. Motor convoys have likewise been carefully scheduled and routed to avoid traffic congestion. Normal road spaces between military vehicles have been lengthened as a convenience to passing vehicles traveling in the same direction.

Motor convoys listed in latest concentration tables vary in size from 2 to 201 vehicles; the largest, carrying Wisconsin troops, will be divided into four sections and will be approximately six miles in length.

The 108th Observation Squadron will fly from the Municipal Airport (Chicago) to Kellogg Airport, Battle Creek, Mich., on August 8. The 107th Observation Squadron will fly from its base at Wayne County Airport, Romulus, Mich.

Railheads of the VI Corps will be opened for supply to incoming troops at Allegan, Pearl, East Saugatuck and Camp Custer (all Michigan) at 9 A.M. or earlier on August 7.

HOME FROM ABROAD

Gen. and Mrs. Charles Keller of 503 Willow road, Winnetka, returned July 6, from a trip abroad, having been gone for a little more than five weeks. They went first to Brussels, where General Keller was a delegate of the State department of the United States government to an executives' meeting of the International Navigation association. From Belgium, Gen. and Mrs. Keller crossed to England for two weeks, which they spent in London and motoring through rural England.

VOTE NEW HALL

The special election in Northfield Thursday, July 16, for the purpose of voting on a proposed \$12,000 bond issue to build a new village hall, carried by a vote of 70 to 15. The new building is to be erected at once at the southeast corner of Willow and Happ roads. The Village board will hold a meeting Thursday evening of this week to open bids submitted by numerous contractors.
