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Court Decree Orders Gas Station Permit

Judge John Brystalski, sitting in the Circuit court, Chancery division, on Monday entered a decree in favor of the Pure Oil Products company on its petition to restrain the Village of Wilmette from interfering with its construction and operation of a gasoline filling station at Main street, Ashland avenue and Sixteenth street, the intersection being at the north limits of the village. Upon the decision of the Village board to not appeal the case to the higher courts, the decree made it mandatory upon Building Commissioner William A. Wolff to issue a permit for the erection of the building, which he did on Wednesday. This action brings to a close a controversy over the terms of the zoning ordinance as applied to this particular property. In view of recent decisions of the higher courts in similar cases, it is explained, Village authorities did not feel justified in incurring the expense necessary to the contest the action through the courts.
