

"Silver Hind" Wins Snipe Race Although Owners Trade Boats

In a light southwest breeze, shifting to south and with a sea of only small waves, a fleet of seven snipes turned out for a Sunday morning informal race at 10:45 o'clock off Wilmette harbor, over the regular triangular course of 3½ miles plus an additional leg to the south buoy and return, making it a five and a half mile race.

The order of finish was follows:

Bill Park's—Silver Hind first. Time, 1.41.10.

Borgfeldt's—Hussy second. Time, 1.49.

Wilson's — Moby Dick third. Time, 1.49.50.

Hayes'—Stelor fourth. Time, 1.54.

Johansen's—Gladiator fifth. Time, 1.55.

J. Holly's—Xaire sixth. Time, 2.01.

Harris Barber's No. 1922—(as yet the new nameless waife)—took a foul and sailed out of the race on a disqualification in accident-collision with the Hayes' "Stelor" at the starting buoy.

This race featured several changes in skippers, notably such as Bill Park's recent crew K. Eastman taking Silver Hind over the course as skipper and with his own crew, demonstrating Silver Hind in its own sailing qualities by the wide margin of 7 min. 50 secs. shown. As mentioned in previous announcement, "Silver Hind" seems with little doubt now, the probable champion of the fleet and Chicago area for the Oshkosh internationals at the end of August.

On Saturday afternoon, five Snipes being present, a hastily arranged informal was also run—this having been a windward and leeward of about six miles in all—the marks being to the south 3 miles "Star" buoy and return.

On Sunday afternoon the No. 13 Point Score race was to have been held, the course having been laid the same as the morning informal, 5½ miles, in a south light to fresh breeze very variable and at times almost negligible, and with some small chop of a sea, with considerable drifts to northward.

On Thursday evening between 7:30 and 8 o'clock, another twilight race was scheduled to be sailed—starting from the pier semephre station and ending off the end of the pier, with the finishes within 200 feet of the spectators' and committee's view.
