



Dedication of New Trier High school's \$140,000 natatorium, now being completed, has been set for Friday and Saturday of next week, it was announced yesterday by Matthew Page Gaffney, superintendent.

The dedication will be accompanied by a program which is being arranged by Edgar B. Jackson, member of the physical education department of the school and swimming coach for the past 20 years.

At the same time, it was added, there will be an open house for the general inspection of buildings.

By Ticket Only

The seating capacity of the natatorium, it is estimated, will be about 1,200 persons. Admission will be by ticket only, the distribution being through the school students. There will, however, be no charge for the tickets, it was explained.

As far as possible, admission will be limited to the residents of the township. A special performance will be held for the students beginning at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, October 17. The adult programs will begin both nights at 8 o'clock.

Wally Colbath and his troup of swimmers and divers from A Century of Progress will be on hand to perform, as will an aquatic ballet group from the Shawnee Country club under the direction of George Eckert. Members of the ballet will be Mr. Eckert's two daughters, Claudia and Mary, and Polly Krafefter and Jean Sollit.

Band Concert

Members of the high school band will give a program. There will be cheers by the leaders and a selected group of students, and high school songs by the combined octets.

A. R. Peterson of Kenilworth, president of the board of education, will deliver the dedication address.

Henry Holquist of Oak Park, state high school diving champion will perform, as will a number of boys and girls from the New Trier swimming teams
