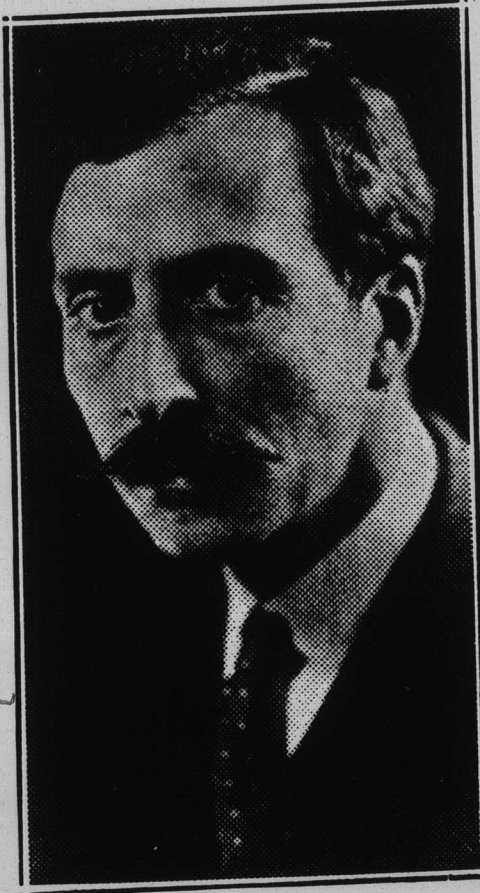

Survey Shows Housing Shortage

The following tabulation of a housing survey made under sponsorship of the Evanston-North Shore Real Estate board, under the direction of W. G. Ruggles, chairman, should be of interest to all New Trier residents. In addition to the information given below, it is significant to note that of the 5,153 apartments in Evanston, the percentage of vacancy is 1.76 per cent. Also, that there are only 89 houses available for rent on the north shore out of 12,090 surveyed, and only six apartments out of the 580 surveyed. The tabulation follows:

One of the country's most outstanding musicians makes his tenth appearance this coming week with the Chicago Symphony orchestra, under the direction of Frederick Stock. In the triple role of composer, conductor and pianist, the ever popular Ernest Schelling will be presented to the Thursday-Friday subscribers in Orchestra Hall Thanksgiving evening and Friday afternoon.

Mr. Schelling is one of the most active figures in American music. As conductor of the New York Philharmonic Children's concerts he has made of this series a national institution. His compositions are part of the repertoire of all leading orchestras. Two of his works will be performed on this occasion: his Impressions from an Artist's Life, in the form of Variations, with Mr. Schelling at the piano, and a new work, Suite Varié, consisting of seven parts, conducted by Mr. Schelling.

DeLong of the department of political science at Northwestern.

Mr. Schlotfeldt will open the series on Monday, November 23, when he speaks at 10 a. m. in Harris Hall on the Evanston campus on "Problems of the Administration of the Immigration Laws of the United States."

The program will also include Glazounow's "Carnaval" overture; selections from Moszkowski's "Boabdil"; the Dance of the Nymphs and Satyrs from George Schumann's "Amor and Psyche," and Johann Strauss' Emperor Waltzes.

Wettergren Will Make Local Debut in "Carmen" Friday

The third week's Chicago City Opera schedule released by Paul Longone, general manager, is replete with features as were the first two weeks of the season.

Most notable among these features is the debut here in opera of the famous contralto, Gertrud Wettergren. She will sing the part of Carmen, a role in which she is especially famous and for which she was highly acclaimed in New York by the critics when she sang the role with the Metropolitan. She is one of the five famous international singers who are being introduced in opera for the first time in Chicago by Mr. Longone.

Stephano Ballarini will also be in this performance in the role of Escamillo. His singing in "La Fiamma," in which he made his introduction to the Chicago opera-goers, was well received by the critics here. As he will have a chance to do much more in this more tuneful role, he is expected to score even a bigger hit.

Saturday matinee of the third week will bring back to Chicago the first time this season two other famous singers. They are Ezio Pinza, basso, who will have the part of Mephistopheles in "Faust" and Carlo Morelli, who will have the important role of Valentine in the same opera.
