

"Modern Alaska" Will Be Theme of Benefit Lecture Next Monday

Robert D. "Bob" Hall of Wilmette to Relate Experiences

"Modern Alaska" will be the subject of an illustrated lecture to be given by Robert D. "Bob" Hall of Wilmette, Monday evening, February 8, at 8 o'clock, in the Howard school auditorium. Mr. Hall will appear under the auspices of the Junior Friends of Wilmette, an organization of young people which supports a scholarship at the Chicago Junior school in Elgin. Proceeds will go into the scholarship fund.

Worked, Traveled, Studied

Mr. Hall, until recently a student at the University of Alaska, spent two years in the Alaskan territory, working, traveling and studying. He has long been a resident of Wilmette and is a graduate of New Trier High school. His sister, Marion, has remained in Alaska, and is a sophomore at the University of Alaska, the northernmost school of higher learning on earth, being located four miles from Fairbanks and 120 miles south of the Arctic circle. Robert Mochler of Wilmette enrolled at the university recently and is now president of the Freshman class. The total enrollment is about 200.

Relates Experiences

Acting upon an urge to travel—especially prevalent among young people during the depression days—Bob and Marion Hall, accompanied by their dog "Bo," departed for Alaska some two years ago, "just to look around." They remained to really absorb Alaskan atmosphere and recorded their travels and experi-

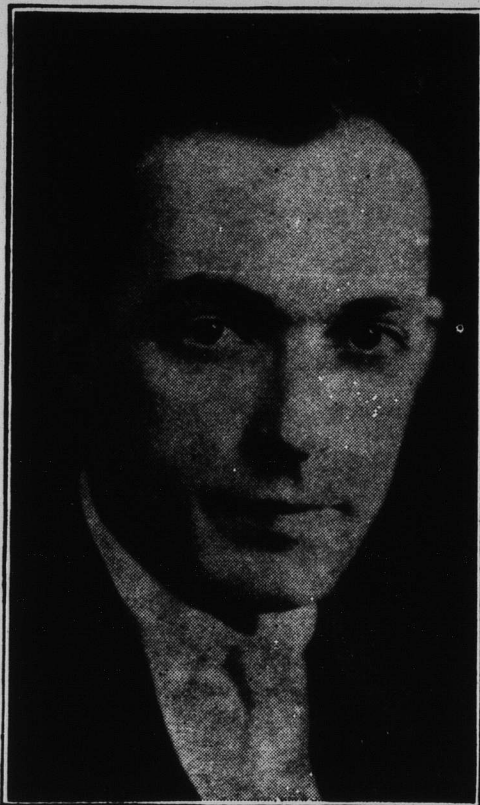
