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Choice Residential Lots Offered in Unit 2 of Indian Hill Estates

Property Restricted, Zoned and Landscaped

New horizons are appearing in western Wilmette, which was the scene of much residential building during the past year.

A number of residential lots in Indian Hill Estates, Unit No. 2, bounded by Illinois road on the west, Lake avenue on the south, 23rd street on the east, and Elmwood avenue on the north have been offered in recent weeks. The offering is sponsored by the Shore-Towns Realty corporation and the Franklin Realty corporation, both of Evanston.

Originally put on the market in 1929, Indian Hill Estates, Unit No. 2 is a choice residential section with winding roads, preferred zoning and careful building restrictions. It is bound on the west by the first unit of Indian Hill Estates, in which are built many of Wilmette's finest residences. It is immediately southwest of the so-called Kenilworth Gardens section.

60 Foot Minimum Frontage

Indian Hill Estates, Unit No. 2, however, differs materially from either of its neighbors. The Estates lots all have a minimum frontage of 60 feet and many run as high as 75 feet, with several corners being even more extensive. These homesites have been worked out in great detail, in accordance with the most modern practice, one of the greatest attractions being that all utilities, including light and telephone, are installed underground, so that home owners never need be faced with the possibility of telephone poles and overhead wires. The street lighting arrangement is highly ornamental and all streets are of concrete.

"Extra" Front Lawns

Another interesting feature of this section is that sidewalks are built immediately adjacent to streets and lot lines are set back from the inside line of the sidewalks. This results in an "extra" front lawn of at

least nine feet for home owners on Cherokee, Pawnee or Miami roads, while those living on Illinois or Pontiac roads gain an "extra" 17 feet. Adequate sewer service, both sanitary and storm, is provided, and the entire unit is attractively landscaped.

Expecting extensive development in this general area, the Wilmette School board has already purchased five acres at the northwest corner of Unit No. 2, on which will be built an addition to the Wilmette school system. It is understood that present plans call for the school to be constructed and ready for operation by the fall of 1939.

High Grade Development

Nearly a dozen homes already built in Indian Hill Estates, Unit No. 2, assure its development as a high class residential neighborhood, it is stated. Three individual owners are now planning homes for construction this spring, and bids are being taken by the Franklin Realty corporation for a Colonial residence to be constructed and offered for sale. Ralph Huszagh, north shore architect, will design the house.

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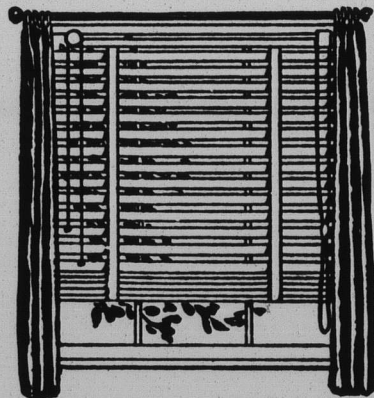
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
