You Must Have Good Receptacle to Insure Proper Mail Delivery

Postmaster Herbert L. O'Connell receives occasional complaints from villagers who have not provided proper receptacles for its receipt, that mail matter, letters, papers, etc., left on doorstep, window sill or porch floor, is blown into the yard by the wind. It is pointed out that such "delivery" is hazardous and may result in the loss of important mail.

The United States Post Office department does not undertake mail delivery where a proper receptacle is not provided. Following is an excerpt from a form, provided all local postmasters by the Postal department at Washington, for notifying patrons of any delinquency in the matter of mail receptacles. It is emphasized that such receptacles are under government control:

"Furthermore, the provision of a mail receptacle of some character, preferably a door slot, is one of the conditions under which carrier service is granted. Where patrons fail to furnish receptacles the service is not extended. As you have had service for some time the Department is averse to withdrawing it, if it can be avoided. Unless you will cooperate with the Department by installing a suitable receptacle of some kind within the next 30 days, delivery service

will be withdrawn, and it will then be necessary for you to call at the post office for your mail.

"In this connection it may be stated that the Department does not approve or recommend any particular style or make of mail receptacle, but prefers a door slot, which can be provided without injuring or defacing the door in any manner. This will not only insure the prompt and safe delivery of your mail, but will result in improving the mail service for the entire community."
