

THESE 5 JUDGES TO DECIDE CHILD BEAUTY CONTEST

**Distinguished Leaders Will
Pick Winner of \$100 Prize;
Closing Date Set as June 26**

Five prominent Evanstonians, leaders in child welfare and in the field of art will judge the third annual north shore Child Beautiful contest.

Their names were announced this week as follows:

Mrs. Budd C. Corbus, 2746 Euclid Park, vice president of the Evanston Visiting Nurse association and former chairman of the Woman's club art committee.

Mrs. Robert M. Grier, 1714 Asbury avenue, president of the Junior auxiliary of the Infant Welfare society.

Mrs. Philip P. Merrill, 428 Greenwood street, president of the north shore board of the Illinois Children's Home and Aid Society.

Walt C. Otto, 1116 Maple avenue, painter whose portrait of former Mayor Bartlett was much admired at this spring's art exhibit at the Woman's club and whose painting entitled, "Summer," won the club members' popular award.

Charles T. Byrnes, 2411 Payne street, who for the last six years has served as superintendent of the Evanston bureau of recreation, directing the city's playgrounds and beaches.

The date for the closing entries in the contest is now set for June 26. Soon afterward the photos of 300 or more north shore children will be submitted to the judges in order that they may select the winner of the \$100 cash prize and of the four other cash awards. It is expected that their decision will be ready some time after the middle of July.

With only nine days left till closing time, parents who wish to enter their children in this contest to discover the most beautiful child on the north shore are advised to make the necessary arrangements promptly. A studio photograph is required of every contestant, since the judging will be based entirely on photos. In order to simplify the procedure, all the photographs are being made by the Bernie studio, official photographer, and co-sponsor with THE EVANSTON REVIEW in the contest. The studio will provide the judges with a standard-size gloss print of every child.

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
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
