

Offer Numerous Business Courses at Evening School

Several hundred courses in various fields of business and industry, many of them new, will be offered this fall in the evening division of Northwestern university's school of commerce on the Chicago campus. Courses will be taught in twenty-two fields under the general commerce heading.

Instructing these courses will be several visiting experts in addition to the augmented regular faculty of the school. Among the outstanding men in their fields who will teach are Coleman Woodbury, director of the National Association of Housing Officials and member of the Chicago Housing Authority; W. S. Martens, credit manager of Carson Pirie Scott & company; Ira D. Anderson, formerly assistant chief of retail trade of the U. S. Bureau of the Census; Ernest H. Hahne, professor of economics, Northwestern university; Lester M. Elliott, C. P. A., of Arthur Anderson & company.

Among the fields in which students will be enrolled are: accounting, advertising, business law, economics, statistics, taxation, banking, finance, insurance, real estate, marketing, sales, retailing, trade, organization and management, public utilities, transportation and business writing. Registration started September 7 and first classes will be held September 22.

Waldorf Will Have Hard Time to Keep '36 Title

Northwestern university's football team will begin the defense of its Big Ten championship Friday, when a squad of 80 candidates reports to Coach Lynn Waldorf at Dyche Stadium for the opening practice.

The Wildcats are confronted with the task of rebuilding last year's title winner since graduation thinned the ranks of 16 lettermen who played important roles in last year's campaign. The position hardest hit by graduation were tackle, guard, center and fullback.

Coach Waldorf, who shuffled players about last year until he molded together a winning combination has an even more difficult job this fall.

Need Fullback

If the Wildcats can come up with a fullback to replace Geyer and Toth, last year's stars, the backfield situation will be a long way towards being solved. Two sophomores, Jack McGurn, who prepped at St. George High school, Evanston, and Jay Laskay of Lorain, Ohio, are the leading candidates. Both showed ability to smash a line in spring practice.

The other backfield positions are well manned. Capt. Don Heap, one of the leading Big Ten backs, will be at left half where he will have the support of Bob Swisher, a fleet senior who was ineligible last year. Vanzo will have better support this fall from a pair of promising sophomores, Nick Contreas of Waukegan, and Joe Hay of Rock Springs, Wyo.

Bernie Jefferson, long legged Negro boy, has the call on the right half assignment which he clinched as a sophomore last fall. "Jeff," the only triple threat performer in the Wildcat backfield, will take over the kicking now that Toth is gone. Clarence Hinton, another speedy Negro, Iggy Mesec, a junior, and Reynold Soukop, Chicago sophomore, are other right half candidates.

Great Line Gone

Northwestern's great 1936 line was fairly riddled by graduation; losing 11 lettermen. The only veterans returning are John Kovatch and Cleo Diehl, ends; Bob Voigts, tackle; Mike Calvano, guard, and Edwin Wegner, center.

Nick Cutlich, 235 pound sophomore from East Chicago, will be groomed for left tackle to replace Gibson and wray, last year's stars. Voigts, a junior, will be at right tackle. He will get help from Frank Young, 195 pound sophomore from Ponca City, Okla., and Bill Springer, a senior.

Guards Hard Hit

The guard positions were hard hit at diploma-time, losing Steve Reid, All-American right guard, and Les Schreiber and Carl Devry left guards. Mike Calvano, Reid's understudy for two years, and Hal Method, promising sophomore, are the leading right guard candidates. Dick Wells, who earned a minor letter last fall, and Don Guritz, 200 pound sophomore, will fight it out for right guard.

Loss of Leon Fuller at center leaves this position wide open. It will be fought over by Edwin Wegner, lanky senior; Bob Koble, a junior, and John Goldak and John Haman, sophomores.

Despite the loss of Bender and Zitko, two lettermen, the end positions are well fortified. Kovatch and Diehl, last year's first stringers, are back. Supporting this pair are Ed Klamm and Tom Eby, lettermen, and several likely looking sophomores, Bob Daly of Evanston and Ted Grefe of Des Moines, Iowa.
