Beetle Trap

If the Japanese beetle tribe has any of its advance guards planted in the North Shore, the United States department of agriculture's bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, in cooperation with state and local officials, propose to locate the little pests and launch an early campaign of extermination before they get a foothold here.

The department has placed 200 green and white metal traps each in Wilmette and Winnetka, such as shown in the photograph above, by means of which it will be possible to determine whether the Japanese beetle is present. Should infestation be found, the information would be used to guide possible control activities, it is explained.

These traps have been placed chiefly in residential sections. Those doing the work have credentials which will be produced on request. State officials ask residents to cooperate in permitting traps to remain on their property for a period of about 30 days.
