

Winnetka Council Approves Plan of Grade Separation

under the local improvement act to construct the grade separation project and to pay for the same by special assessment.

Loan and Grant

Application is to be made on behalf of the village of Winnetka to the United States of America through the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works for a loan and grant to aid in financing the project, all of which shall then be made subject to a majority affirmative vote of the legal voters of the Village of Winnetka at a referendum.

The engineers' estimated cost of the project is \$3,450,000, which is \$1,410,000 less than Winnetka's share of the combined north shore grade separation plan contemplated ten years ago.

Down to \$1,000,000

Application is to be made by the village for a PWA grant to cover 45 per cent of the total estimated cost of the project or \$1,552,500, and a loan of \$1,897,500 to be made by the sponsoring agency, the Village of Winnetka. The share of the cost to be borne by the county highway department and the two railroads, it is estimated, will bring the village's cost down to an estimated \$1,000,000 or less.

"In this connection," the engineers' report says, "it should be noted that the Village of Winnetka is practically free from debt, that it has an assessed valuation of more than \$20,000,000 and therefore may issue, upon approval by referendum vote, full faith and credit bonds to the extent of five per cent of the total assessed valuation, or more than \$1,000,000. It is our opinion that such bonds could be marketed at an interest cost of between 2 and 3 per cent, per annum, at the present time."

Mrs. C. T. Fishleigh and Family Visit Here

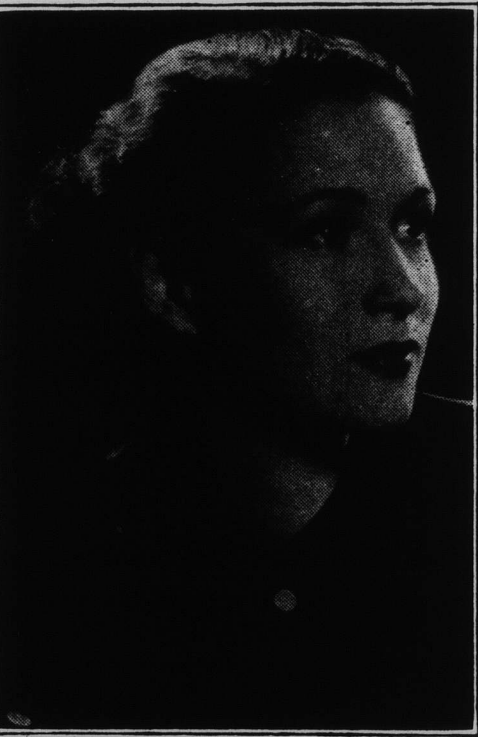
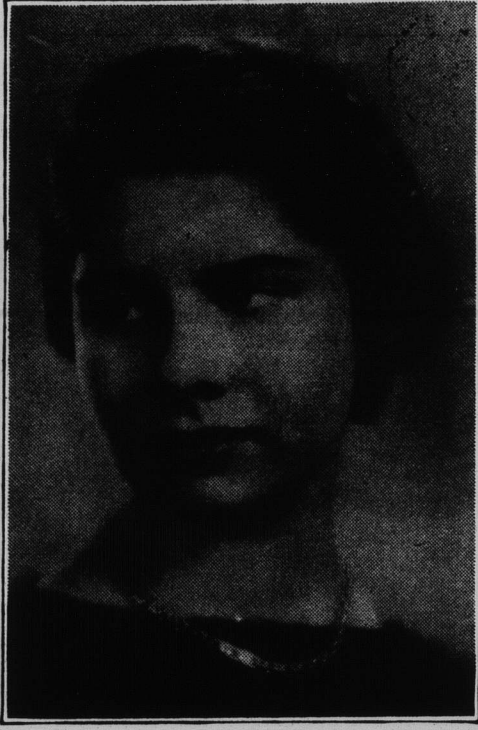
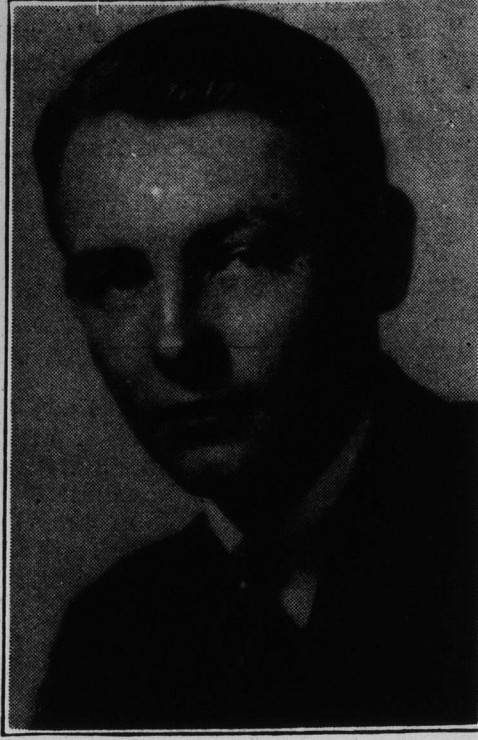
