"Soul" was the subject of the lesson-sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, August 14.

The golden text was, "Hear me speedily, O Lord... cause me to hear thy loving kindness in the morning; for in thee do I trust: cause me to know the way wherein I should walk; for I lift up my soul unto thee" (Psalms 143, 7, 8).

Among the citations which comprised the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "I will bless the Lord at all times: his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul shall make her boast in the Lord: the humble shall hear thereof, and be glad. O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together" (Psalms 34: 1-3).

The lesson-sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Soul, or Spirit, is God, unchangeable and eternal; and man coexists with and reflects Soul, God, for man is God's image" (p. 12).

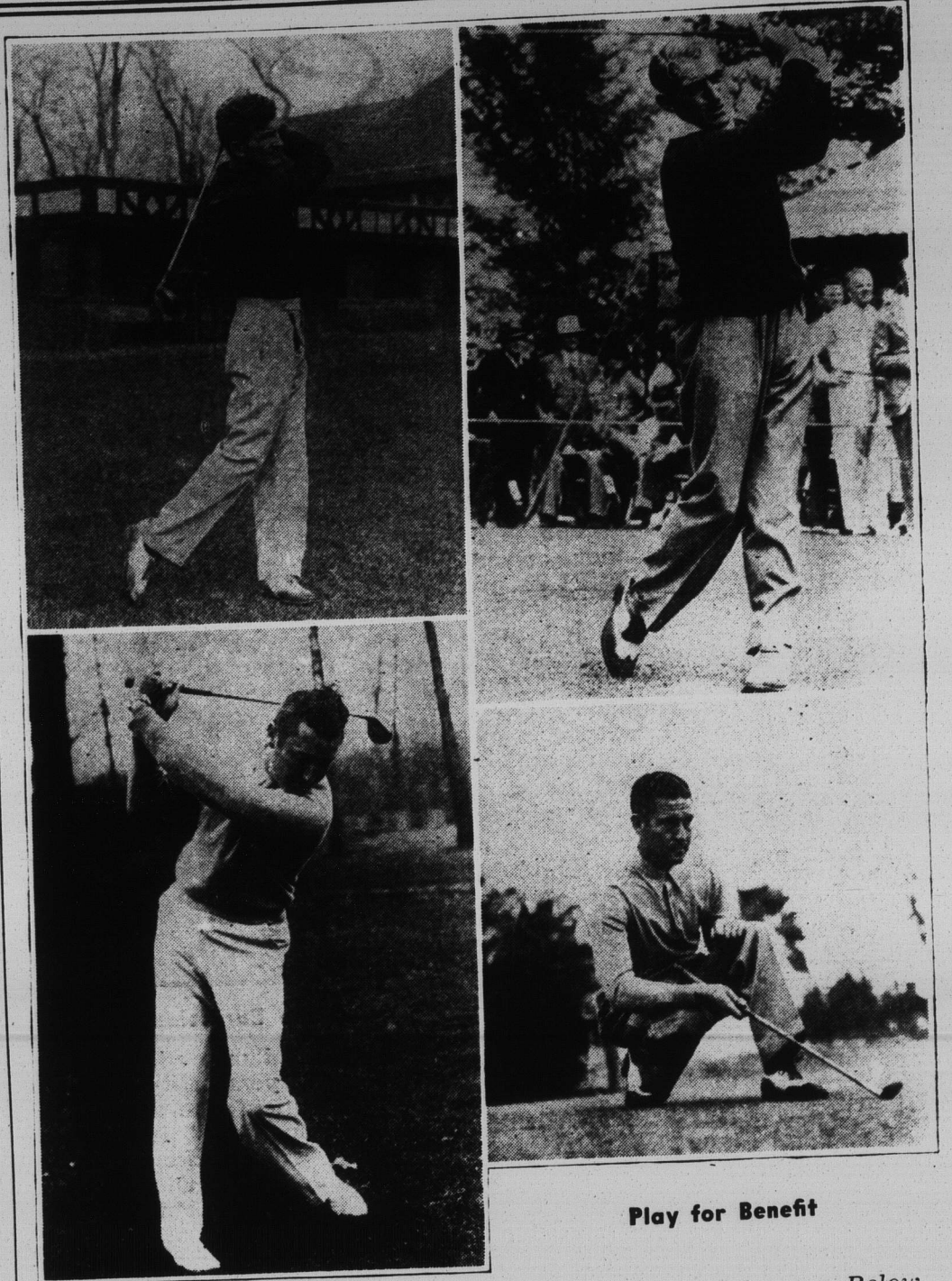

All golfers in the Chicago area are looking forward to the 18-hole exhibition match in which these four popular title-holders of the United States will participate Sunday, August 28, commencing at 2 p.m.

The event will be held at the championship course of the North Shore Country club, on Glenview road, just east of Waukegan road. The players are donating their talent and the club is furnishing the course and its excellent facilities, without cost. The entire proceeds are for the Hadley Correspondence School for the Blind in Winnetka.

Lions Club Project

The Winnetka Lions club, which for many years has actively supported the work of the school, is serving in conjunction with the North Shore Country club and the Illinois P.G.A., in promoting the publicity and advance sale of tickets for the match.

Spectators are assured the greatest exhibition of golf that has been brought to the North Shore in recent years, it is announced.

Set World Record

Metz and Laffoon, 1938 winners of the International four ball match at 38 under par for 129 holes, set a world record for this 16-year old event. They have never been beaten in a team match, but will they have to go some this time, when they meet Tommy Armour and Johnnie Revolta? Metz won second in the 1938 Denver open; 1938 Miami Biltmore; 1938 Hollywood open; 1938 Thomasville open; and was third in the 1938 Chicago open.

Laffoon holds the competitive world record for 72 holes, on a par 72 course, 266 strokes, 22 under par. He was winner of the Radix trophy in 1934, for lowest score average,

72.20 for 77 rounds of tournament golf, and was leading money winner that year. He was a Ryder cup team member in 1935; runnerup in the Chicago open and P.G.A. semifinalist in 1937. Only last Sunday he won the \$10,000 Cleveland open.

Holds Many Titles

Revolta, who won the 1938 \$10,000 Miami Biltmore championship, also copped, the Sacramento open, the St. Petersburg open the St. Paul open and the Illinois championship this year. He was also Illinois champion in 1936 and 1937; was P.G.A. champion, Western open champion and top money winner in 1935, and was twice a Ryder cup team member.

Armour, coming from Scotland, made his first American appearance in 1920, and seven years later won the United States open. In 1930 he won the P.G.A. open; in 1934 the British open; in 1927, 1930 and 1934 the Canadian open and in 1929 the Western open. In the latter tournament, he shot the lowest score ever recorded in a major tournament, 273 for 72 holes. In 1935 he won the Miami open and in the same year was runner-up to Johnnie Revolta in the P.G.A. tournament.
