## Air Travel Week to See 50,000 on Their First Flight

Plans to have more than 50,000 people take their first flights in transport planes during the observance of National Air Travel week from October 1 to 9, were discussed this week by T. Park Hay, managing director of the observance, and officials of leading air lines sponsoring the event.

"During National Air Travel week," Hay said, "the nation will commemorate the tenth anniversary of commercial air transportation and each of the 21 air lines operating throughout the country will conduct special 100 mile sightseeing flights daily at more than 200 cities. These flights will provide an opportunity for more than 50,000 persons to take their first trip in transport planes. Each flight will be conducted in the same manner as a regular scheduled flight. We believe this will do much to portray the tremendous advances that have been made by our industry in the past decade.'

Hay pointed out that 1,250,000 individuals use the air lines annually and that the mass flying during the week's observance will give additional thousands of people an opportunity to view air transport methods at close range.

On regular inter-city air line schedules, Hay estimated that 30,-000 people will travel by plane during National Air Travel week in addition to the 50,000 who will participate in the educational trips.

### Extra-Curricular Activities Vital to School Interest By Marjorie McLean Leary

Extra-curricular activities, in the school, are very important as a means for complete living. Teachers themselves, tend to rate them

higher than curricular - activities with reference to the contribution they make to the objectives of education listed by the United States Bureau of Education in its bulletin, "Cardi-nal Principles of Education.

A few years a go practically all the extra- Marjorie Leary curricular activi-



ties were centered around athletics and the various school clubs. Participation was a matter of choice and not required of any student. Consequently, as these activities occurred after school hours, the anti-social or timid child who most needed the interest and stimulation was deprived of participation because of timidity. Today a definite time is set aside within the regular school program for these activities and every pupil is required to choose his interests. Usually the one period will take care of several activities during the week.

#### Ideal in Boarding Schools

Boarding schools are especially fitted to give stimulation and supervision to these activities as the supervised time is approximately twice as long as it is in the day

Most frequently extra-curricular activities grow out of hobbies or avocations, but frequently they grow out of the regular curricular activities. This is especially true, again, in the boarding school, where the work shop or art studio is never closed. To see a group of these pupils prepare for a play is exceedingly interesting. The stage setting is planned on a miniature model stage in the studio, the costumes are designed and made and the students are given an opportunity to share in all phases of staging and production as well as presentation, even to the printing of the programs.
