Harriet Vittum to Give Next Program for Neighbors Club

The department of social service of the Neighbors of Kenilworth will present Miss Harriet Vittum as speaker for the next meeting on November 15, at the Kenilworth Assembly hall. Using as her subject, "Women's Next Step in Organized Citizenship," Miss Vittum's talk is scheduled for 2:30 o'clock.

Miss Vittum has been head resident of Northwestern settlement for thirty years, was president of the Women's City club of Chicago in the year 1913-14, and in 1914 became candidate for alderman of what is now the twenty-sixth ward. She was also the Progressive party candidate for the Board of County Commissioners in 1914.

In 1916, Miss Vittum was a delegate to the National Progressive Party convention. Her experience and training promise a talk which the department feels will be most valuable and interesting to the increasingly political-minded women of today. Mrs. C. A. Thompson, chairman of the department of social service, will introduce Miss Vittum.

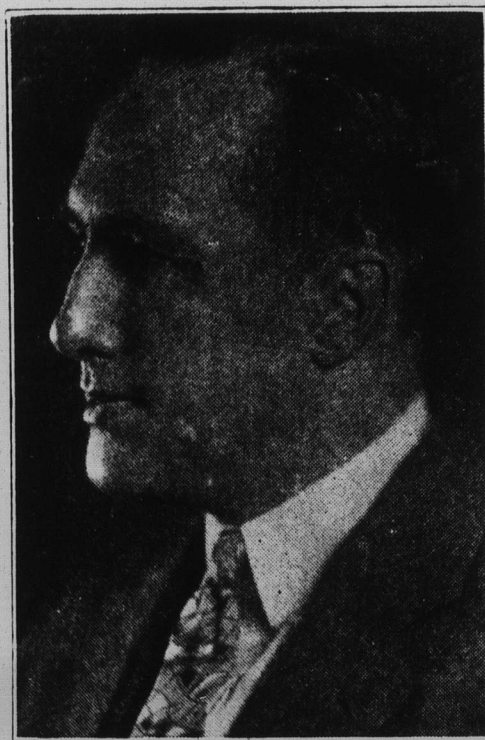
To Study Foreign Policy

Plan Art Lecture at Woman's Club

Lecture on Famous Chinas, Talk on Family Crests, and Guild Theatre on Program

The art department of the Woman's Club of Wilmette, with Mrs. J. Robb Harper as chairman, will present the first lecture in its series on various phases of art, at the opening meeting of the Woman's Club of Wilmette Wednesday morning, November 16.

Mrs. Teresa F. Leigh will tell the story of Lenox, Wedgwood, and Spode Copeland china, weaving into her lecture on these three most famous potters' lives and work, a romantic background of great interest — exhibiting original models made from the earliest wares through present-day models.

Mrs. Leigh will also give some hints on the "Art of Table Setting." She is a resident of Chicago and a former chairman of art of the Illinois Federation of Women's Clubs.

The second hour of the morning, 11:45 to 12:45, will be in charge of the home and education department, Mrs. L. C. Torrey, chairman. A most unusual subject, "Family Crests, Their Origin, Purpose" will be presented by Mabel Louise Keech who is said to be unique in this line. Miss Keech develops heraldry as a science, an art, an hereditary custom; interprets family Coats of Arms from days when identification was necessary, through Crusades, through the American Colonial period, and tells of the influence of heraldry on the designing of our flag.

Members are requested to note a change in the afternoon program from that given in the year book. Instead of George Kin Leung, the literature department, Mrs. Kenneth B. McAfee, chairman, will present two plays by the Guild Theater of Chicago under the direction of Roy Hudson, a young producer who is fast working his way up in theatrical circles. The first play will be a modern version of English mummies, and the second one "A Modern Harlequinade." The cast consists of ten or twelve persons and represents a new creative group in Chicago.
