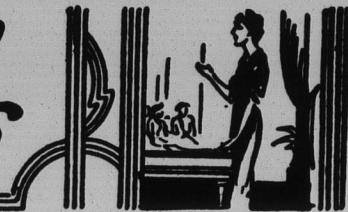

He is rabbi of the North Shore Congregation Israel.
