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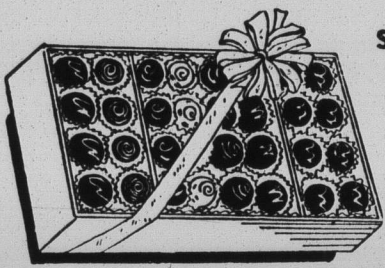


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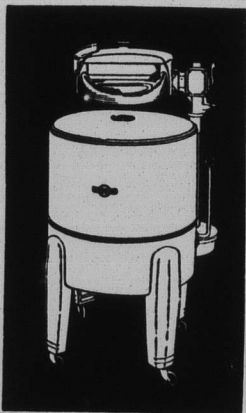
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Moral Rearmament Subject For

Announce Broadcasts

On December 2 and 3, a series of radio broadcasts will be heard by an estimated 100,000,000 listeners in the more than seventy countries where Moral Rearmament is now at work. The time of the broadcasts will be Saturday, 4 to 5 p.m., over station WRUL (short wave 6.04 meg or 11:73 meg) and Sunday from 4:30 to 5 p.m. Efforts will be made to have the programs broadcast over a national hook-up and those desiring to listen in are advised to watch the daily papers for notice.

"These hours on the air will give statesmen and national leaders the opportunity to direct their countries to the guidance of God"—the basic principle of the Moral Rearmament program.

Retain Committee

Under a policy recently established, the budget committee will be continued throughout the year for the purpose of receiving reports of the expenditures as required from the participating organizations, and for purposes of consultation.

The success of the campaign is credited to the extreme care and foresight with which the work was organized. With the experience of former years as a guide, an unusually efficient machine was created whereby the actual solicitation of funds could be spread among a much larger number of workers, thus shortening the time required and giving promise of greater returns. The strategy of this has been proved, Chest officials assert, by the results.
