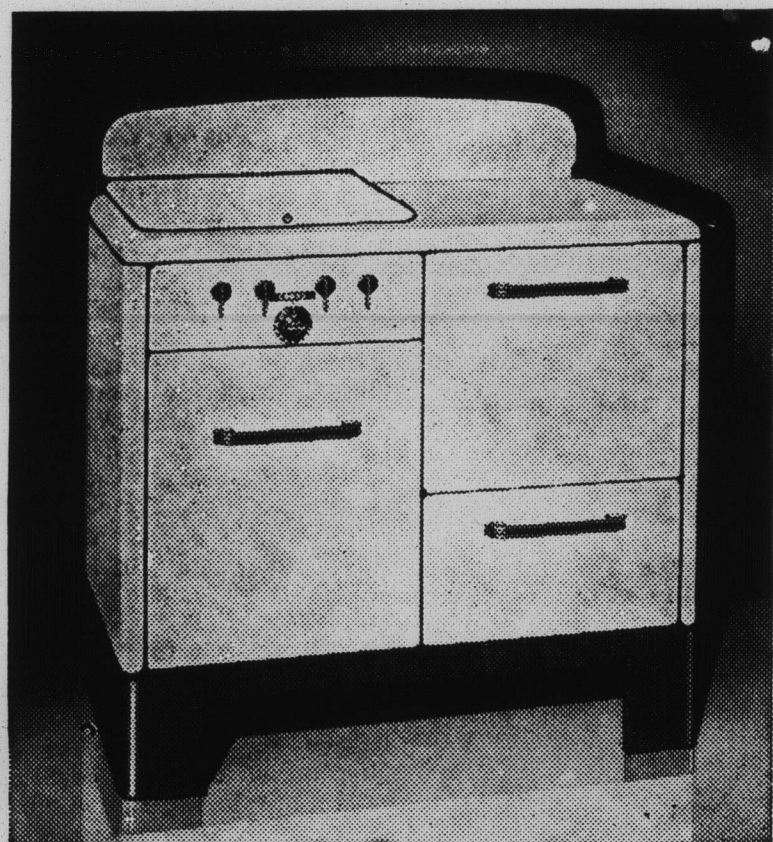

Registration

County Clerk Michael J. Flynn in a letter to all township committeemen, calls attention to the fact that "registration is open in the offices of village, city and town clerks on Tuesday, November 21, 1939, and stays open until Tuesday, January 16, 1940.

"Registration," it is explained, "will not reopen with the village, city or town clerks until June 5, 1940, therefore, please note that registration is not resumed in the offices of village, city and town clerks until after the primary election.

"Your attention is called to this fact so that you may have the unregistered voters in your township call at your clerk's office in your local community; otherwise they will have to call at the County Clerk's office to register."

The Church also announces special Christmas services as follows:

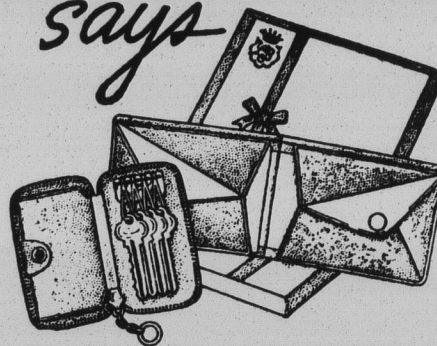
Christmas Eve, Midnight service at 12; Christmas day, Early Morning service at 6:30 a.m.
