Winnetkans Named New Directors of **United Charities**

The election last Thursday of Mrs. Clark J. Lawrence and Donald B. Lourie, both of Winnetka, to the board of directors of the United Charities of Chicago, has increased the already large number of North Shore residents who are volunteering their services in this welfare

Twenty of the agency's 35 board members are men and women who have business interests in Chicago but live in Evanston, Lake Forest, Highland Park, Winnetka, or Lake

Dexter Cummings, president of the United Charities, in reporting at the 83rd annual meeting of the agency, held in the Harris Trust building, Chicago, last Thursday afternoon, announced that almost \$913,-000 had been spent during 1939 and that approximately 65,000 persons had been aided.

Provide Legal Aid

The Family Service Bureaus, maintained by the United Charities in eleven sections of Chicago, served the majority of these people, according to Mr. Cummings, but the Legal Aid bureau, which serves residents of the suburbs as well as the city, helped almost 19,000 persons who needed legal advice but could not afford a private attorney. The agency's camp and country outing program provided vacations for about 2,800 mothers and children last summer.

Speaking of the problems the United Charities is facing at present. Mr. Cummings stressed the suffering caused by the new residence law. This law bars from public aid all persons who have not lived in one township continuously for the past three years. Since the law became effective on November 1, the United Charities has spent over \$7,000 in relieving the most acute

suffering caused by this law.

Law Brings New Burden

"We are spending almost \$1,000 a week at present in helping the victims of this law," said Mr. Cummings, "and even with this, we are not beginning to meet the full need."

Officers who were re-elected at the annual meeting were Mr. Cummings as president; Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen, Sewell L. Avery, and Edward D. McDougal, Jr., vice-presidents; and Solomon B. Smith, vicepresident and treasurer. Joel D. Hunter, general superintendent of the agency, was elected secretary, filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Leroy Berdeau.
