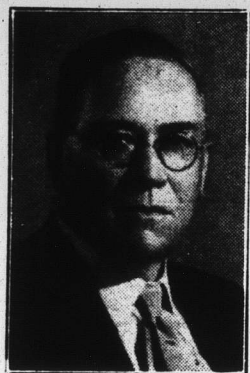

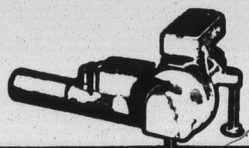

MILK SUPPLY IN WILMETTE CALLED SAFE

**Dr. Seifert Lists Licensed
Dairies; Advises Residents
to Buy Milk Here**

Editor's note: In view of disclosures that impure milk is being purveyed in Chicago and suburban communities, WILMETTE LIFE, this week asked Dr. Martin H. Seifert, Wilmette Health commissioner, to make a statement regarding the milk situation in Wilmette. Dr. Seifert's statement follows.

At the present time the entire milk supply of dealers operating in Wilmette is, we believe, adequately protected by inspection service. We grant licenses to Chicago or Evanston inspected dairies routinely so long as they continue in good standing with the health departments of those communities.

Any dairy not so inspected is inspected through the local health department. At the present time there are seven such dairies in operation here, on all of which we have individual farm inspection six to nine times a year, dairy plant inspection monthly and examination of the finished product at weekly intervals for bacterial and butter fat content. In addition, the Chicago and Evanston inspected dairies are checked weekly for the finished product they deliver.

Buy In Wilmette, Advice

In order to be safe, we advise people who live in Wilmette to buy milk in Wilmette. We cannot be responsible for milk sold outside our limits. We are submitting herewith a list of dairies licensed to sell milk in Wilmette during 1934. If you are getting milk from any other source in the village of Wilmette, it is not authorized at the present writing, and we will appreciate your reporting such sales to the Department of Health, phone Wilmette 2700.
