#### WHO'S WHO IN SCOUTING

This is the sixth in a series of thumbnail biographical sketches of north shore scouters.

#### YOUNG VETERAN

Karl D. King, Jr., now scoutmaster of Troop 22, Glencoe, has had many years in scouting, both as a scout and as a scout leader. Before he became a leader in the movement, Mr. King was a scout for seven years. In 1926 he was named assistant scoutmaster of



Troop 1, Wilmette, iis home troop. After serring three rears in this caacity, he became coutmaster of that ame troop from 929 to 1931. The 1 e x t fourteen nonths he served is chairman of the roop committee. While he was still hairman of Troop l committee he noved to Glencoe

and was appointed Karl D. King, Jr. commissioner of the Glencoe dis-

trict. For the year 1933 he was acting in two capacities-assistant scoutmaster of Troop 22, and commissioner of the Glencoe district. He has served in 1934 as scoutmaster of Troop 22.

Mr. King has always been ambitious scouting. Last summer at Camp Mafrom his troop than from any other Bob, has been an Eagle Scout and is troop in the council and more than 75 to serve in Wilmette as a leader.

## Nature Study Course Ends This Sunday

The nature lore specialization course for scout leaders, conducted by Jim Mooney, nature director at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan, will have its final instruction session Sunday afternoon, November 18. The course has had two sessions, one on trees and plants and one on animals and snakes.

Depending upon the weather, the men will either be in scout headquarters, or again in the field and will study reptiles, birds and geology. Birds, of course, will not be plentiful, but signs such as nests and other marks will be witnessed and discussed.

An examination held Tuesday evening, November 20, will complete the requirements of ten hours of study. Men who have completed the work will receive certificates in the specialization course in nature lore.

## University of Scouting Will Convene Monday

The fifth session of the University of Scouting will be held Monday, November 19, at Christ Church Parish House in Winnetka. The men enrolled in the elements of scoutmastership course will be addressed by H. R. Smith, former scoutmaster of Troop 33, Highland Park, on the subject of "Putting the Out in Scouting." Mr. Smith will include in his discussion all phases of troop camping so that his talk will virtually outline an adequate outdoor program for a scout troop. The principles course will discuss the same subject with Mr. Smith and will also discuss troop program building. The first aid course will continue its line of study towards the completion of the work required by the American Red Cross for its certificate.

Cub leaders of the North Shore Area council journeyed to Aurora on Monday and Tuesday of this week to attend a specialization course in Cub leadership. The course was conducted by Charles F. He also conducted the Cornell Home Study Course in Scoutmastership. His training courses are informative and entertaining and he presents things the "play way." He is a great exponent of that type of educational procedure.
