# Symphony Will Go "Urban" on Friday

"City Life" is the theme of the first half of Dr. Frederick Stock's symphony program this Friday afternoon in Orchestra hall. The orchestra goes strictly urban and plays Deliu's "Paris: A Night Piece" or "The Song of a Great City"; Read's

Huberman, who will play Beethoven's Concerto for Violin in D major. Though this is Huberman's second visit to play with the Chicago Symphony, few of the patrons in Orchestra hall will remember the occasion of his first appearance. This visit was made in the sixth season, 1896-7 when he was listed as "Master Huberman, the Boy Violinist" and played Mendelssohn's Violin Concerta in E minor.

Born in Poland, Huberman took up the violin at the age of six. He studied with Joachim, and at the age of twelve made his first great triumph with Adelina Patti in Vienna. It was for this great violinist that the city of Genoa, trustees for the sacred violin of Paganini, passed a law allowing Huberman to use the relic, and cast a medal commemoraing the occasion. During the years he has been before the public, Huberman has been the recipient of honors from practically all European capitals; in 1930 he received the order of a Chevalier in the French Legion of Honor.

Dr. Stock and the orchestra will present the first of the season's Young People's programs next Wednesday afternoon at 3:45.

Now in their sixteenth season these concerts are designed for children, young people, and students, and offer an unparalleled opportunity for young people to gain an invaluable insight into the forms of great music. The concerts are interspersed with comments by the director on the music about to be played.

The program for the opening concert consists of Thoias' overture to "Mignon"; the Adagio molto from Beethoven's Symphony No. 2; Grieg's "Peer Gynt" Suite No. 1; the Infernal Dance and Berceuse from Strawinsky's "Fire Bird" Suite; two dances from Moszkowski's Suite "From Foreign Lands," and the Strauss waltz, "Roses from the South."
