Dr. Tittle to Tell of Great Religious Conferences Abroad

Dr. Ernest Fremont Tittle, minister of the First Methodist Episcopal church, Evanston, will speak at the Wilmette Parish Methodist Episcopal church Friday evening, October 22, at 8 o'clock, giving a "close-up" of religious conferences he attended this summer in England.

Two notable world conferences were held this summer, one at Oxford, July 12-25, and the other at Edinburgh, August 3-18. The purpose of each was to secure a more unified front on the part of all Christian churches.

In Oxford delegates and visitors from all over the world representing all Christian Protestant creeds faced the great problem of the church in relation to what can be done to work toward the solution in the light of the teachings of Christ, of the present world problems of the weakness in our social order; of our economic difficulties, and of war and peace.

Of these matters those who hear Dr. Tittle will be given first-hand information. The meeting is sponsored by the Woman's Missionary society of the Wilmette church, and the public is invited.

Seek Applicants for Appointments to West Point and Annapolis

Congressman Ralph E. Church, of Evanston, announced this week that a vacancy for the 10th district (which includes New Trier) is scheduled to occur by graduation in June, 1938, at Annapolis and West Point, respectively. He has been called upon by the War Department and Navy Department to appoint candidates to fill each of these vacancies.

A principal and three alternates will be named for Annapolis and a principal and two alternates for West Point. The appointees to West Point will be examined by the War Department on March 1, 1938, and the appointees to Annapolis will be examined by the Navy Department on February 16 or April 20, 1938.

In order to give the young men interested in these appointments equal opportunity to qualify, Mr. Church announced that he would hold his usual competitive examination of all candidates under the auspices of the Civil Service commission on Saturday, November 6. He has arranged with the commission for the examination to be held in every city in the 10th Congressional district where the Board of United States Civil Service Examiners maintains a local secretary as follows: Antioch, Barrington, Chicago, Evanston, Glencoe, Grayslake, Highwood, Lake Forest, Libertyville, North Chicago, Waukegan, Wilmette, Winnetka, and Zion.

All candidates must be actual residents of the 10th district, of sound physical health and good moral character. Those competing for the Annapolis appointments must be between the ages of 16 and 20, and for the West Point appointments between 17 and 22.

Letters of application to take the competitive examination should be addressed to Congressman Ralph E. Church at either 10 South LaSalle street, Chicago, or House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. The applicant should designate where it would be most convenient for him to take the examination.

All letters of application must be postmarked before midnight, October 18.

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
