

### North Shore Educators to Speak at Childhood Education Meet Nov. 13

The first sectional meeting of the Central Council of Childhood Education, Saturday morning, November 13, at 10:45 o'clock, 22nd floor, Medical and Dental Arts building, 185 North Wabash avenue, will include studies of the personality development of the child from infancy through adolescence.

Each of the four sections offers an able speaker on a subject related to establishing in the child a sense of security in his own age group as well as in his relations with adults.

Guidance in child growth will be presented by parents as well as by directors of schools, psychiatrists, and other authorities on child study.

Dr. Howard A. Lane, Northwestern university, and Mrs. Rae Logan, a member of the Parent-Teacher association of the Winnetka Nursery school, will address the Nursery section on: "Guiding Parents as a Means of Child Development." Mrs. Aileen Robinson, North Country Day school, Winnetka, will speak to the Kindergarten section on: "Personality Development of Young Children." The Primary section will hear Dr. Paul Moore, School of Speech, Northwestern university, on the subject: "Speech Re-Education." Dr. Malcolm Finley, psychiatrist, Winnetka Public schools, is the Intermediate section speaker on "Personality Development of the Adolescent Child."

### Begin Play Series for N. S. Children

Excitement is running high at the Children's Demonstration school of the National College of Education this week with the dramatic production of a favorite fairy story, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," and the opening of the school's annual exhibition and sale of books scheduled for the same day, Thursday, November 11.

The play is the first in a series of four to be given during the winter and early spring at the National College of Education, and is being given by professional actors from the Children's theatre of New York. By sponsoring these children's dramas, the school expects to further the national movement for promoting "good theatre for children," according to Miss Clara Baker, director of the Demonstration school.

Parents as well as children are interested in the dramatization of these favorite stories of childhood. Many north shore families have taken seats for the entire series of plays and will see "The Nuremberg Stove" on January 27, "The Captive Maid of Old Carlisle" on March 3, and "Daddy Long-Legs" on April 7.

The exhibition and sale of the newest books for both children and adults, which is sponsored by the Parent-Teacher council each year to benefit the library fund of the Demonstration school, opens on Armistice Day and continues through Friday, November 12. The books used for the exhibition are selected by the council's library committee and represent weeks of reports and consultations with publishers and book experts about the newest books for grown-ups, while all the children's books have the approval and rec-

ommendation of the faculty of the Demonstration school.
