Outstanding Authority Bishop Oxnam is a religious leader, an educator, an author, and a public lecturer. He studied at the University of Southern California, at Harvard, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and in Japan, China and India. Every summer he travels abroad to the key spots of the world. He was a member of the American delegation to Russia in 1926 and to the lapanese Education Commission in 1932. He served on the faculties of the University of Southern California. Boston university, and for eight years was the president of DePauw university. Founded in 1906 by the late Peter Christian Lutkin, the Northwestern university A Cappella choir, (above) which will appear in Wilmette the evening of December 8, is one of the oldest college organizations of its kind in America.

The choir has played a significant role in the development of the art of unaccompanied singing in this country, according to critics, and as early as 1908 performed intricate numbers, presenting Mendelssohn's "Elijah" in the first North Shore Festival, now known as the Northwestern university music festival, which was held that year.

Each year the choral organization has enlarged its repertory to include some of the greatest works of the world's composers. Program-building has been the aim of the present director, Max T. Krone and critics agree that he has achieved a versatility of selections which strengthen the choir's appearances immeasurably and lend a dramatic quality and diversity peculiar to the a cappella group.

During the 1937-1938 season, the engagements of the A Cappella will be limited in number and the Wilmette concert will be the annual Christmas appearance of the choristers. The group will sing in the sanctuary of the Wilmette Parish Methodist Episcopal church beginning at 8:15 o'clock.
