

Chi Omega's Hobby Show Is Set for Nov. 27

But it is all different in Chi Omega's North Shore Hobby and Handicraft show which will be held in the Woman's club in Evanston from noon until midnight, Saturday, November 27.

The patrons and patronesses of that occasion are making a real hobby of their job. They are working hard to make the event a real success, first because the proceeds of the show will be given to philanthropies to which the Chi Omega sorority contributes, including the Medical Service of Berea college in Kentucky, the Evanston Community Chest, and the Northwestern Settlement; and, second, because it will be the first hobby show ever held anywhere on the north shore.

Amazing Accumulations

Mrs. Frank N. Mason, Jr., the general chairman, said yesterday that the accumulation of hobbies sent in by adults is "amazing" as well as interesting and these sent in by children emphasize the importance of hobbies to the wholesome imagination of those from seven years of age up.

Mrs. Edmund Richer, chairman of the program, has announced that during the afternoon there will be special features for the entertainment of the children consisting of a Marionette show, a Puppet show, and moving pictures. There will be special features for adults, including a talk by Ruth Wallace Wagner on "Early American Lamps," which will be given during the "Tea Hour." This will be followed by a talk by Mary Beinfuhr on "New Books for Children." In the evening, between 8 and 9 o'clock, there will be an exhibit by the Theater Workshop, under the direction of Hope Summers. There will be dancing from 9 until midnight.

Numerous Collections

In the department of collections there will be shown surprising collections of antiques, Indian relics, prints, first editions, book plates, glass, sea shells, stamps, post cards, butterflies, coins, miniatures, medals, trophies, autographs, firearms, historical relics, dolls, puppets, pipes, scrap books, etc.

In the department of creative art

there will be drawings in pencil, pen, crayon, charcoal, prints, etchings, water colors, lithography, wood cuts, sculpture, modeling, soap sculpture jewelry, metalcraft, photography, etc.

In the department of handicrafts there will be exhibits of weaving, beadwork, leathercrafts, basketry, woodwork, papercraft, carving, book-

binding, furniture, quilts, rugs, wrought iron, marionettes, puppets, musical instruments from the Orient, South Sea Island and South America, model building to scale of boats, coaches, houses, airplanes, and railroads, etc.

The group activities shown during the event, which will seem like a miniature World's Fair, include the musical, sports, travel, gardening, dramatics, writing, sailing, flying, archery, astronomy, etc.
