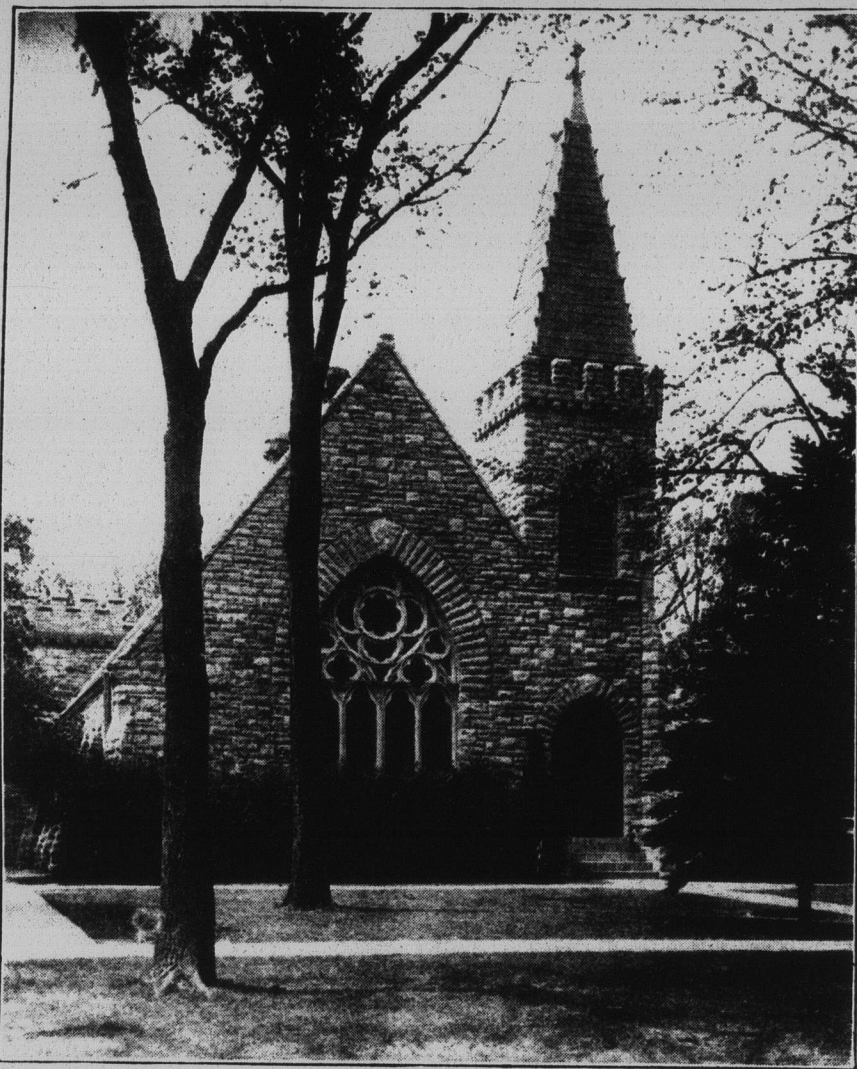
Not all of the distinguished patrons are occupying boxes however, as the main floor seats reserved for the benefit at the Civic Opera house will be entirely filled for the occasion.
