legality of an ordinance when subjected to the crucial test of the courts. They also eliminate much difference of opinion among citizens and officials and go a long way toward building confidence in the ordinance and the plan. For these reasons the first step in the formation of a permanent plan should be the preparation of a **present-use map** of the problem areas. In this preparation the Zoning commission can secure a great deal of valuable data from the Evanston-North Shore Real Estate board and the Chicago Regional Planning association. Both of these organizations would undoubtedly be glad to serve in an advisory capacity without compensation, thus affording the Zoning commission and the Village board the advantages of expert real estate knowledge and trained planning thought.

### Wilmette Faces Crisis

Wilmette today faces a crisis in its zoning situation. In the last dozen years we have experienced two violent extremes—abnormal prosperity and abnormal depression. During the latter experience many properties adjacent to commercial areas have depreciated tremendously. As times get better owners will give consideration to improvements which can be made on a profitable basis. If reasonable zoning restrictions are not established, recourse will be had to the courts, with the possibility that the whole village may be thrown wide open to undesirable improvements. That can be averted now by proper zoning standards, permanency of zoning classifications and continuous enforcement.

There can be no excuse for further delay in taking these forward steps.

## Church School Has Revised Program

"Gentlemen of Guatemala" who inhabited "The Most Noble and Most Loyal City of Saint James" as their coat of arms of 1523 described them. Culture radiated to other countries from this seat of learning.

The city is ideally situated about a mile above sea level in a lovely valley between the Cordillera and the volcanoes Agua, Fuego and Acatenango, which are as high as the Alps and as symmetrical as Fuji-yama. The climate is perfect being one of eternal spring with a temperature around seventy and with moderate humidity.

In 1620 the Royal and Pontifical University of San Carlos was founded and today this building with its great patio surrounded by lovely fretted arches is still used as a school.

The sturdy Palace of the Captains General with its dozens of stone pillars, in excellent condition after several centuries, gives good evidence of the substantial quality of colonial architecture.

There are so many ruins of churches and cloisters in the city that it would require many weeks to examine all of them.

### Capital Is Removed

After Central America secured its independence from Spain in 1821 efforts were made to continue the old Captain-Generalcy of Guatemala as the United States of Central America, but these efforts were not successful so at the present time the old Captain-Generalcy consists of five republics, Guatemala, Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica. The securing of independence, however, was not responsible for the decline of Antigua for the capital was removed to Guatemala City in 1775. An earthquake in 1773 and a desire of the government to weaken clerical power were the principal reasons for the transfer of the seat of government.

Wilson Popenoe, American botanist, introduced the avocado or alligator pear from Antigua to the United States where it is now cultivated in California and Florida. While in Antigua with her husband, Mrs. Popenoe secured one of the old Spanish homes and completely refurbished it so that the visitor of today may have the same experience when entering the home that the visitor of three centuries ago had when he called upon the owner.

Antigua is still unspoiled by the tourist, but if the influx continues to increase at the present rate it may lose some of its charm.
