

## Table Tennis Stars to Hold Suburban Tourney in Glencoe

The Suburban table tennis championships will be held January 13, 14, and 15, at the North Shore Table Tennis club, 655 Vernon avenue, Glencoe, it was announced this week. Sanctioned by the Illinois Table Tennis association, the tournament will be open to residents of all Chicago suburbs.

Ralph Muchow of Evanston is the defending champion and has entered this year's event. Muchow is classed as the leading player of the Chicago area by virtue of his number nine ranking in national table tennis men's singles. He is the only Chicago representative in the first ten ranking. Possessed of a fluent stroking all-round game, his presence assures the tournament of a number of interesting matches. In winning the Suburban title in 1936, Muchow defeated Dan Kreer of Winnetka in a brilliant hard-hitting match.

### Play in Many Divisions

Divisions of play in the suburban tournament include men's singles and doubles, women's singles, mixed doubles boys (under 15), and veterans (over 35). A consolation event will be played in the men's singles class. Men's doubles and veteran's singles will be played Thursday evening, January 13. Men's singles will be played Friday evening, January 14. The boys' tournament will be held on Saturday morning, January 15, and the women's singles and mixed doubles on Saturday afternoon. Finals will be held Saturday evening, January 15.

Herman Freundlick of Wilmette will defend his championship in the veteran's class. Defending champion in women's singles is Mildred Wilkinson third ranking women's national player, who now living in the city will be unable to defend her title.

The tournament will be directed by Jay Purves, former national women's champion, who has charge of the North Shore Table Tennis club. Entries may be made at the club, which is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings and Sunday afternoons or mailed to Gerry Schnur, 141 Park avenue, Glencoe. The North Shore club is open to the public on the above mentioned occasions, and all interested in table tennis are invited to inspect its facilities.

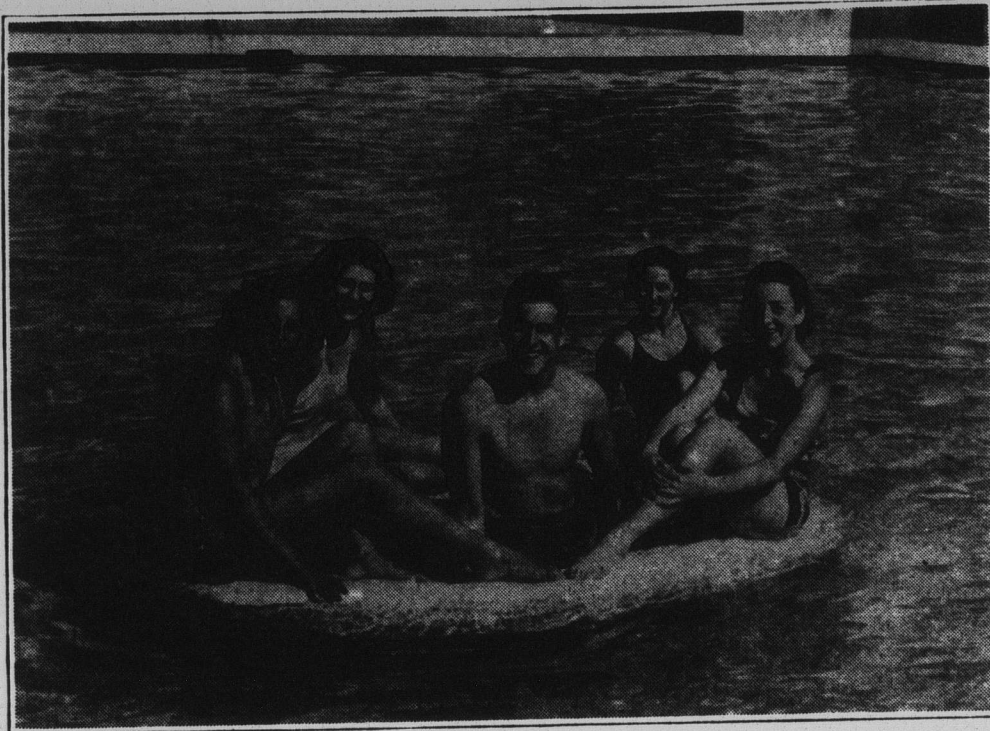
