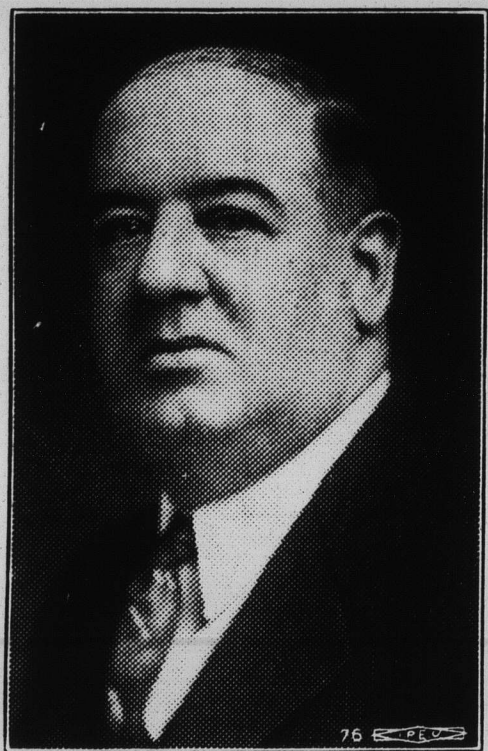

Offering more than 400 courses under a faculty of 300 teachers, the Northwestern summer session will open June 21 and close August 13. Eight departments of the university, including liberal arts, education, speech, graduate, law, music, commerce, and journalism, will give work.

40 Groups Affiliated With Evanston Council

The north shore's first Institute for Social Agency Board members will be held Monday in an all-day session at the Georgian hotel, under the sponsorship of 40 groups affiliated with the Evanston Council of Social Agencies.

Purpose of the institute is to give board members of welfare agencies the opportunity of having their own "school" in social work policies and procedures. Its object is to further cooperation between lay boards and professional social agencies, and to give workers in both groups an interpretation of their work in relation to the community as a whole.

Noted Leader

Heading the one-day institute will be Miss Leah Feder, assistant professor of social work at Washington university, St. Louis. Miss Feder, who has successfully conducted similar meetings in other cities, will lecture and lead discussions on the many problems confronting board members of welfare agencies.

Among the topics to be considered will be the relationships between lay and staff workers in welfare work, inter-relationships between organizations, and the responsibilities of the individual board member.

All-day sessions are scheduled from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Georgian and include a luncheon meeting at which Miss Feder will speak. Allen D. Albert, Jr., one of the directors of the Family Welfare association, will introduce Miss Feder at the luncheon, which will be attended not only by delegates to the all-day sessions, but by business men unable to be present at the morning or afternoon meetings.

Among the groups invited to participate in the institute are the Adult Education council, American Red Cross, Arden Shore association, Big Brothers association, Boy Scouts, Bureau of Recreation, Business and Professional Women's club, Central Volunteer Bureau, Community Chest, Community Hospital, Council of School Clubs, Day Nursery, Health Department, Evanston Hospital association, Evanston Relief administration, Evanston High school, Family Welfare association, Girl Scouts Illinois, Birth Control league, Illinois Children's Home and Aid society, Infant Welfare society, Inter-Racial council.

Junior league, King's Daughters, Mary club, Ministerial association, Salvation Army, School Children's Welfare association, Society for Crippled Children, Swedish Relief and Aid society, Visiting Nurse association, Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A., Woman's Club Social Service department, Thrift House, and the local boards of the Chicago Commons and Northwestern Settlements.
